Trip To Canada Started Things With President

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25—When President Roosevelt arrives home from his voyage on the cruiser Tanandaro to the Inter-American peace conference in Buenos Aires, it is believed he will have established a new record for Presidential travel.

The President made his first official goodwill visit to a foreign country last summer when he went to Quebec to meet Lord Tweedsmuir, governor-general of Canada and Prime Minister Mackenzie King. He then told the Canadian people that "rank dealing, co-operation and a spirit of give and take between nations is more important than ever before" in solving world problems.

Carrying the prestige of a tremendous popular triumph at the polls, Uncle Sam's No. 1 travelling salesman will present in person his "good neighbor" doctrine at the Buenos Aires peace and trade conference, which opens Dec. 1. Some observers view the visit as possibly the first move in a spectacular Rooseveltian effort to promote amity among the great powers of the world.

While statistics of the mileage covered by the chief executives are not complete it was figured recently that Mr. Roosevelt's total before starting the long South American voyage was about 63,000 as compared with some 65,000 for jolly William Howard Taft and from 55,000 to 60,000 for strenuous Teddy Roosevelt.

Franklin Roosevelt is an indefatigable traveler by train and automobile but it is on the sea he has loved since boyhood that he really shines as the greatest Presidential voyager of all time. While he has covered many thousands of miles in campaign swings, drought and food region tours his major mileage has been piled up in water voyages taken mainly for rest and recreation.

Longest of these were his trips to Hawaii and through the Panama Canal in the summer of 1934, and from Los Angeles to Charleston, S. C., by way of the canal in the fall of 1935. Others are his summer vacation cruises in the North Atlantic, winter fishing jaunts to southern waters and week-end trips down Chesapeake Bay.

In going to South America, Mr. Roosevelt shatters a cherished 10-year tradition—that of having Thanksgiving (Nov. 26) dinner with the crippled children at Warm Springs. For a decade he has carried the turkey annually for youngsters undergoing treatment at the Georgia resort. However, he may visit Warm Springs in a few days on his way back to Washington.

Prince Edward Island In The Sixties

Helen Harper Steeves writing in the Saint John Telegraph-Journal of Prince Edward Island in the Sixties says:—

It was in the sixties that Mr. and Mrs. Hooper, residents of eastern New Brunswick, planned a visit to Prince Edward Island for themselves and guests, Mr. Ashmead, an English paymaster to her Majesty's forces in Sierra Leone, and his wife, a former resident of New Brunswick.

Following a day spent in sight-seeing in and around Charlottetown, plans were made for an excursion into the country the following day. A coach and pair were engaged, and the party left for Bagnalls, a well-known hostelry, some fifteen miles from Charlottetown.

The visitors driving leisurely along were startled by a bugle call which rang out clear and strong from a distant farm house. The call was almost instantly answered by a similar call from another direction, and before long the whole countryside resounded with the call of bugles. And now, almost before Mr. Hooper could answer the inquiries of the English visitors as to the meaning of the sound—that the call was a call to arms on the part of each farmer to his neighbor, a signal that a proposed eviction was about to be made which they, as members of the Tenant League, were in duty bound to oppose galloping horsemen were seen dashing towards the highway from the farms bordering the roadside. In front of their carriage on either side of their carriage, and behind their carriage, a small army of cheering, jeering riders, shouting words of defiance as they brandished rifles and other weapons, came dashing along the highway. Such mad excitement on the part of a mob of naturally law-abiding citizens showed that they felt that only armed resistance to recognized authority could they obtain their just rights! Mr. Hooper was about to be evicted for non-payment of rent. Not if the Tenant's League could prevent it.

Turning for a moment from controlling his excited horses, Mr. Hooper became aware that the sheriff and land-agent from Charlottetown, in a light carriage, were following closely behind his vehicle. It was evident that they were on their way to make the eviction and were seeking the protection from the menacing horsemen afforded by their proximity to the strangers whom the farmers would naturally wish to spare all

Norfolk's Men Work Overtime On Coronation

LONDON, Nov. 25—Upon the 28-year-old former cavalry officer, the Duke of Norfolk, rests the duty of stage managing one of the greatest pageants of a generation, the coronation of King Edward VIII.

More onerous still is his task of picking the audience. By installing a gallery and crowding the seats of Westminster Abbey can be made to hold between 7,000 and 8,000 persons. Untold thousands would like invitations; at least five times the number who can be admitted may think their high positions or titles entitle them to be present.

Fortunately for himself, the stage manager occupies a place in society from which he is immune to retaliation from disappointed ticket seekers. Few are in a position to rub the Duke of Norfolk, hereditary Earl Marshal and Chief Butler of England, premier Duke and Earl.

Already the Duke has given up residence at Arundel Castle, Sussex, his principal estate, to full-time work on the difficult problems of the coronation. Associated with him are the officers of the College of Heralds, of which he is president, in study of century-old decision on precedence.

His offices occupy a whole house near Buckingham Palace, a 10-hour day will be the rule from now until just before the coronation next May 12.

The Duke, who is unmarried, received his invitation into ceremonial affairs last January, when he was in charge of King George's funeral. So far he has not displayed the interest in public affairs which resulted in many of his ancestors reaching other extremely high public offices—and in the execution of others for attempting rebellions.

Since the Middle Ages the Duke of Norfolk had almost always been Earl Marshal, and the practice has been unbroken since 1672.

Time was when the Earl Marshal stood next to the King at the coronation and helped him put on the crown. This has been discontinued, but the Duke—also Earl of Arundel Baron Maitravers, Earl of

Tells Of Quints In Caesar's Day

LONDON, Nov. 25—Interest in the Diomed quintuplets, continue in Great Britain unabated. Learned letter writers to The Times have carried the discussion a step further by delving into the classics for precedents and to prove that multiple births have been of interest through all ages.

The eminent Scottish judge, Baron MacMillan, a Privy Councillor and a Lord of Appeal in Ordinary, writes that "the advent of the Canadian quintet was hailed as a unique phenomenon, but a precedent is to be found in so unlikely a quarter as Justinian's Digest," he quotes the words of Gaius, the Roman jurist: "Indeed, in our own time, Seraplas, a woman of Alexandria, was brought to the Divine Hadrian with five children whom she had borne in one birth, although it almost seems a monstrosity that more than three should be born."

Lord MacMillan is outdone in antiquity, however, by D. C. Dalziel, King's College School, Wimbledon, who cites a passage from Aulus Gellius (Book X, c 2) interpreted thus: "Aristotle, the philosopher, recorded that a woman in Egypt bore five boys in one birth, and he said that this was the limit of multiple birth for human beings—And when the Divine Augustus was reigning, a maid servant of Caesar Augustus in the neighborhood of Laurentum was said to have given birth to five boys who lived for a few days, and a monument to her was erected in the via Laurentina by order of Augustus."


