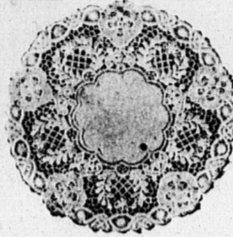

the most scientific men of the air in the world took part. In an interview with The Guardian representative they said that it had to be seen to be understood and appreciated. Watching for a signal one after another the machines went into the air from their hangers in front of the grand stand, raising gradually as a bird takes flight until eleven monoplane and bi-planes were whizzing past at the rate of a mile a minute—the operators having perfect control of their differently constructed machines. Three in the altitude flight. Messrs Drexel, Anson and Count De Lesseps passed out of sight behind the clouds, attaining an altitude between 8000 and 9000 ft then coming down to earth as gracefully as a bird, alighting with equal grace. Many places of interest were visited, notably the new Public Library, Metropolitan Museum of Art, the new Pennsylvania central depot, and tunnel. The latter passes under the Hudson river, commencing on the New Jersey side under the city between 31st and 33rd Sts and on under the East river to the mainland, a distance of between five and six miles.

The depot (all under ground) is the largest in the world covering an area of 28 acres. They also visited the Cathedral of St. John the Divine, the foundation stone of which was laid nineteen years ago and seven years more will be required for its completion. When completed it will be the fourth largest in the world. First, St. Peter's at Rome, second, Cathedral at Milan, third, the Mosque at Constantinople. The immense organ was the gift of Ex-Governor Morton, costing \$60,000. The historic stone, from the reputed burial place of the apostle John, has been placed in front of the high altar in the choir. It is surrounded by a brass border on which is this inscription: "Whosoever shall have prayed at this spot shall have pressed with his feet a tile from the ancient church of St John the Divine built by Emperor Justinian at Ephesus in the year 540 over the traditional grave of St John the Divine." One feature of their visit: alighting to temperance they informed The Guardian that while away where

they saw several million people they failed to notice one single individual under the influence of an intoxicant. Dr. Strickland attended while in New York a meeting of the Dental Society where he witnessed several clinics and saw many new and important devices, in operative and mechanical dentistry.
