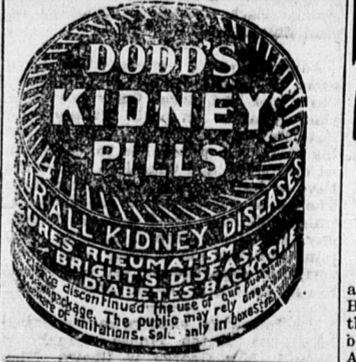

AIRSHIP WAS BADLY DAMAGED

FRIEDERSCHAFEN, July 16—An other accident to Count Zeppelin's balloon this morning will prevent the possibility of the twenty-four hour trip, which was scheduled for today. The damage caused to-day to the mammoth airship by a defect to the steering gear, had been fully repaired and Count Zeppelin had decided to start on his 24 hour flight this morning. Following the program the balloon was brought out of its shed at 11 o'clock. When the order to cast off was given and sufficient headway had been acquired to permit proper steering, a gust of wind blew the airship against the side of the outer rubber covering was torn away and the side propeller was bent. The balloon remained hanging in this position for ten minutes, its bow in the air and its stern resting in the water. It was eventually freed from this position and towed back to the shed. An inspection of the damage was made after it was announced that it would take a week to effect repairs.
