Piloting Big League Club Was Babe's Greatest Ambition

NEW YORK, Aug. 26 (AP)—"Maybe it was for the best that I never had a chance to manage a big league ball club," Babe Ruth said in one of his infrequent interviews a short time before his death. "I would not have had as much time for the kids."

Time might have given him a chance to pilot a major league outfit. He had his heart set on managing New York Yankees, especially when such contemporaries like Ty Cobb, Tris Speaker, George Sisker, Rogers Hornsby, Eddie Collins and Walter Johnson all served as high-salaried big-league managers.

He thought the death of Miller Huggins in 1929 opened the door to opportunity. He went to Col. Jacob Ruppert at the latter's brewery and applied for the managerial job. But the Yankee owner gave it to pitcher Bob Shawkey.

Ruppert lasted only one season. Babe Ruth went to see Ruppert. "Believe me, Babe, my heart tells me to give it to you," Ruppert told him, "but my better judgment tells me not to."

For years you broke all the rules. You couldn't take care of yourself. How do I know you can handle other men when you couldn't handle yourself?"

Ruth was then through the ropes. Babe answered, "I've learned my lesson."

Ruppert remained unconvinced and engaged Joe McCarthy, released as manager of Chicago Cubs. "The Babe grew bitter over this. As long as he remained with the club, there was a chill between him and McCarthy."

Two years later Ruth finally received an offer to manage a big-league club but forfeited this chance when he decided to keep a barnstorming appointment rather than meet with Frank Navin, Detroit owner for a conference.

By the time Ruth returned, Navin had purchased Mickey Cochrane from Philadelphia for \$100,000 and made him manager of the Tigers.

Protest Of Pirates Is Upheld

NEW YORK, Aug. 26 (AP)—President Ford C. Frick of the National League today upheld the protest of the Pittsburgh club involving its game yesterday with Brooklyn at Pittsburgh and ordered the game replayed from the point of the rule violation.

In the last of the ninth inning of yesterday's game, with Brooklyn leading 11 to 9 and Carl Erskine pitching for the Dodgers into a force play to end the game, Erskine had relieved Hugh Casey and Brockman was the only man he faced.

The protest was based on a violation of rule 17, section 4, which provides that a pitcher going onto the mound shall continue to pitch until the player at bat has either been put out or has reached first base, or the side has been retired.

Frick ruled there had been a rule violation, and that the outcome of the game might have been affected inasmuch as the Pirates had the tying runs on the base.
