BUFFALOES FOR ENGLAND.

A pair of buffaloes from the great Canadian herd in Buffalo Park, Wainwright, Alberta, will be shipped to England early this fall for the purpose of introducing new blood into the herds in the Zoological Gardens at Regent's Park, London. The shipment will be accompanied by an attendant, who will place the animals on board ship.

The only herd of buffaloes of any size in England is that owned by the Duke of Bedford at Woburn Park, containing about sixty animals. Buffaloes were first introduced into the Old Country in 1821, when ten full grown animals were shipped by Colonel C. J. Jones, famously known as "Buffalo Jones," from his own herd at McCook, Nebraska, to C. J. O'Leary.

Some of these afterwards came into the possession of the Duke of Bedford and were added to by purchases from Col. Goodnight and Carl Hagenback.

The shipment of buffaloes from the Canadian herd at Wainwright

this fall will be the second of its kind to Great Britain. Late in 1913, at the instance of the late Lord Strathcona, a donation of two three-year-old bison was made to the Royal Zoological Society of Ireland to be placed in the Dublin Gardens, where they have now increased to five. Loans of buffaloes to the Zoological collections in various Canadian cities under a bond guaranteeing adequate provision for the health and maintenance of the animals have also been made from time to time.
