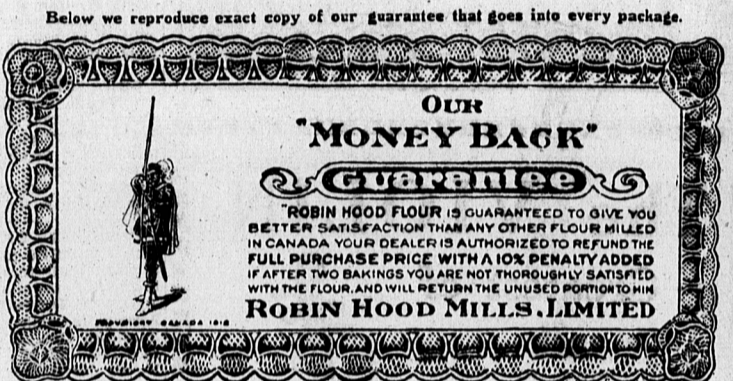

west of Charlottetown or Summerside he gets home sooner now than in the old days, with a couple of hundred miles of car fare saved. And this is what Mr. Fisher calls "going backward."

In the old days every man, woman and child who left our Province had to stay in Georgetown over night, and the same applied to those coming, only they had to stay at Picton. Whereas now no one going west of Charlottetown, excepting the few who come from Boston and from Montreal on the Ocean Limited, are delayed anywhere and no one living in and between Charlottetown and Summerside have to stay over night when leaving the Province.

These are not my opinions, they are facts that cannot be refuted. By all means let us get improved service, if it is feasible, but don't forget the rights of others.

Correct! But misrepresentation of what we have, will never get it. This method might be all right among a crowd of uneducated foreigners, when you want to work them into a passion over imaginary grievances and the like, but it will not work on P. E. I. I am, Sir, etc.,
