COURT OF APPEAL.— The Court of Appeal in Equity met yesterday, the Chief Justice and Mr. Justice Hazard residing. Judgment was delivered in the Leslie Will Case. This was an application by the Executors of the will of Henry A. Leslie to the Vice-Chancellor for the interpretation of the will to find if the widow of deceased was entitled to dower in the real estate of her husband in addition to the bequests given her under the will. The Court of Appeal sustained the decision of Vice-Chancellor Fitzgerald in holding that the widow was not entitled to dower in addition to the benefits given her under the will and dismissed the appeal with costs. K. J. Martin, K. C., for the widow, appellant; W. E. Bentley, K. C., for the defendant executors; J. J. Johnston, K. C., for Bridge Bowness and another defendant; and Charles R. Smallwood, K. C., for the infant defendant.

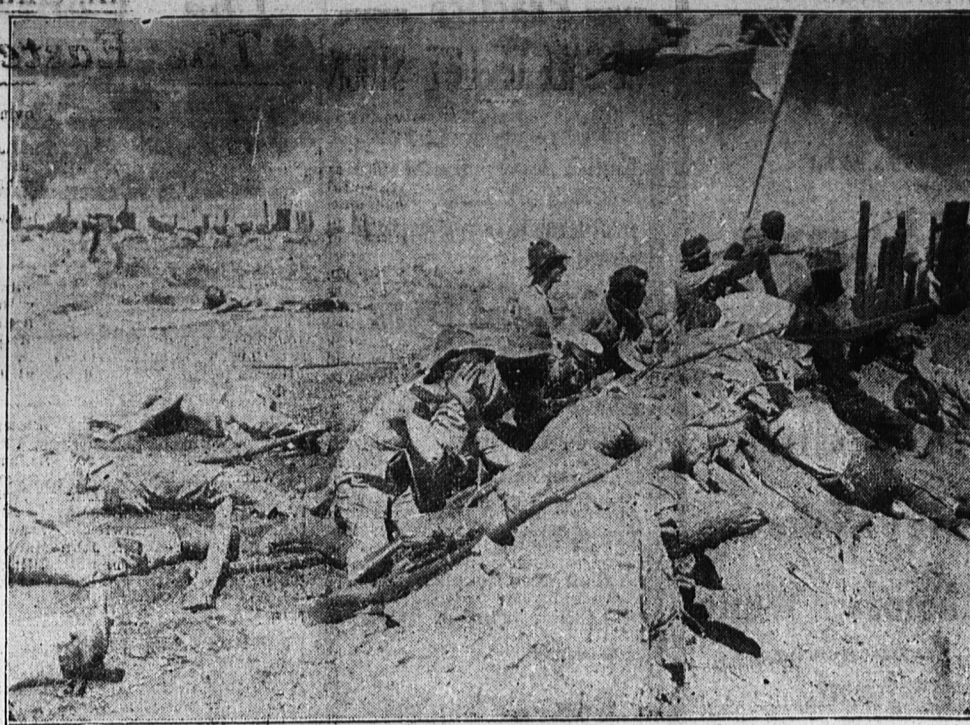
CAR FERRY STEAMER.— The Car Ferry Steamer has been carrying an amount of freight to and from the Island this winter far beyond anything in the history of winter navigation here. From Georgetown daily the average cargo outward have been from 200 to 500 tons while the inward cargoes daily average from 200 to 400 tons. The passenger service has also been unusually large, there being a daily average of from 75 to 125 passengers going and coming.
