**DEATH OF NORMAN GILLIS, B. A., M. Sc.**

The body of the late Norman Gillis arrived in Charlottetown by the mail special yesterday, and the funeral will take place this (Saturday) afternoon from the home of his father, Alex Gillis, 37 upper Hillsboro St. Services commencing at three o'clock instead of 2 o'clock as previously announced, and the cortege will leave the house at 3:30 sharp for the railway station, from there by train to Brookfield Cemetery, where interment will take place.

The following will be the pall bearers: L. Wadman, Moncton; Prof. Bennett, Millar, F. J. Holman, Fred Nash and Walter Burke, Charlottetown.

The ultimately death of Norman Gillis, eldest son of Alexander and Mrs. Gillis, formerly of Hartsville, Queen's County, and now of Hillsboro Street, Charlottetown, will call for more than ordinary regret. He was one of the most brilliant students who attended our Prince of Wales College. At the early age of twenty-eight years, just on the threshold of his manhood, and at the beginning of what promised to be an unusually celebrated career, his life has been cut short and his gentle spirit has returned to Him who gave it.

He entered the Prince of Wales College at the early age of sixteen years, winning the Scholarship for Queen's County, and taking up second year work, graduating in 1902, and with a First Class Diploma and winning the John Caven Prize. For two years, he taught school at Hartsville, subsequently matriculating in to McGill University and winning a Scholarship of \$150, per annum. His work was "excellent" and he led his class of his first year with high honors, carrying off the \$25 prize for the best student from the Maritime Provinces. In his Third Year at McGill, he won a scholarship of \$300, also taking high honors in prizes in the Spring Examinations. In 1908 Mr. Gillis graduated from McGill at the age of twenty-four years, receiving the Degree of B. A., and winning the Anne Molson Gold Medal, carrying with it very high honors and prizes. It is worthy of note that the above mentioned prize had not been awarded for several years, as no student has made the necessary high averages. He then taught in McGill for two years, and during his first year, studied for the Degrees of M. Sc., when only twenty-two years of age, with distinction he received in 1909, when only twenty-five years of age.

His incessant study and arduous work began to tell upon him and he was advised by his physician to take a rest. This he did and apparently seemed to be regaining his usual health and hopes were entertained for his complete recovery, but only last week did his case become serious, he having contracted a grippe, resulting in his untimely death.

By the death of Norman Gillis, one of the brightest scholars, of the many brilliant young men who have left this province is removed. It is not too much to say that had his life been spared, he would likely have become one of the most distinguished Professors of McGill University. His time was short, but he filled every hour of his life with the most worthy of the best. The deepest sorrow is expressed by all who knew him, and the Guardian joins with them in heartfelt sympathy for the bereaved parents and family.
