Callup Is Extended

OTTAWA, Aug. 18 (CP)—Men reaching the age of 30 this year and married men up to 35 years of age now are subject to call for compulsory military service under an extension of the callible classes announced by week-end, drop the minimum callible age from 18 to 16, but limit callible men up to 35 years of age. Men shall not be served with notice to report for medical examination until they reach the 16th anniversary and six months after the date of their 18th birthday. The extension makes married men of 27 and 30 subject to call for the first time. Previously married men up to 25 were liable to call, and as those classes go by date of birth, the 26th anniversary was made when they were 25 when the previous extension was called with their birth year class.
