LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY

Prince Edward Island RULES RELATING TO PRIVATE BILLS.

36. All petitions for Private Bills must be presented within fourteen days after the commencement of the session exclusive of adjournment.

37. No private Bill shall be brought into the House, but upon a petition first presented, truly stating the case at the peril of the suitors for such Bill and such petition must be signed by said parties.

38. A committee will be appointed at the commencement of every Session consisting of five members, of whom three shall be quorum, to be designated "The Private Bills Committee" to whom shall be referred every private Bill, and no proceedings after the first reading shall be had upon such Bill until such Committee has reported thereon to the House.

39. So soon as the Committee has reported any Bill, such Bill together with any amendments that may be suggested by the Committee, shall be printed at the expense of the parties who are suitors for such Bill and printed copies thereof delivered to the members before the second reading, if deemed necessary by the Committee.

40. No Bill for the particular interest of any person or persons, Corporation or Corporations, or body or bodies of people shall be read a second time until all fees be paid for the same into the hands of the Clerk of the House.

41. No Bill having for its object the vesting in or conferring upon any person or persons, Municipality or Body Corporate the title to any tract of land shall be received or read in the House unless at least for four weeks notice containing a full description of the land in question has been published in the Royal Gazette and one other newspaper in this province of the intention of such person or persons.

EVANGELISTIC SERVICES IN CHRISTIAN CHURCH

Last night at the Central Christian Church, Evangelist Lowell C. McPherson spoke on the subject, "The Mind of Christ in You," taking Phil. ii. 5 as a text: "Have this mind in you, which was also in Christ Jesus."

In part, Mr. McPherson said: "That most needed in our world is the mind of the Christ of God. This sweeping passage—Phil. ii. 1, 2—is a wonderful record of the Son of God, reaching back into the eternity of the past and forward into the eternity of the future, and including the brief years of His presence on earth in our form and flesh. What hardened heart can withstand it? It is certainly a reflection on the intelligence and moral character of a man, these days, not to believe in Jesus Christ, not to become His sincere follower and thus try to enlist others to follow Him. Who here to-night wishes to announce yourself as taking such a stand? Would you be proud of it? Then the devil is proud of you. You are either for the Christ or for Satan, and thus for or against your homes. Jesus said that he who is not for Him is against Him. There is no middle ground."

"Are you ashamed to acknowledge Christ before me? Whosoever is ashamed of me and of my word, He said, 'of him will the Son of Man be ashamed when He comes in the glory of His Father with His holy angels.' And 'he who has not the spirit of Christ is none of His.' How we need in us the mind of Christ, as parents, as fellow-Christians, without sectarian favour and prejudice, as citizens, to uphold the honour of our laws with out dodging and wincing, as examples before the boys and girls, to teach them honour and reverence towards God!"

"There are they who deceive themselves—or let Satan deceive them—into thinking they have the mind of Christ when they pay compliments to the Church, attend at their own convenience, pay their debts and taxes and do not openly steal nor lie, but who are ashamed to acknowledge Christ in the presence of witness, and never pray with their children or other loved ones, and do not lead them into the Kingdom of Christ. Many such deniers of the Christ are adept at pointing out weaknesses and faults in those of the Church, when they themselves know in their hearts the spirit of Christ is not there, but the cowardly spirit of the devil. Such deniers of the Christ do not build churches, do not hold up Sunday schools, and have to depend on Christians to provide moral, spiritual, Christian training for their own homes. If everybody in Charlottetown were of the spirit of such deniers of the Christ, this city would have no churches, no Christian homes, no schools, no legitimate business and profession. In fact we would not have a Charlottetown here."

Sunday Mr. McPherson expects to preach in the morning on the subject, "Christian Growth." In the evening, "The Providences of God and God's Answer to Prayer."

Evangelist Lowell C. McPherson is preaching strong, eloquent, convicting sermons each evening at the Central Christian Church. You are missing a great spiritual treat when you absent yourself from these services. The pastor, Mr. W. J. Whitehead extends you a most hearty welcome.
