MILITARY FLYING MACHINES ON SEA AND LAND.

The performances of the hydro-plane, or flying boat, at the recent naval review in England are admitted to make it clear that one of these craft might quite readily put a battleship out of action, or send it to the bottom of the sea.

From time immemorial spies were sent out by opposing armies to discover, as far as they could, the strength of the enemy and the disposition of his forces. Following this came the practice of sending out a force of cavalry to break through the screen behind which the main strength of the enemy was concealed, and so gather the desired information.

But down to a hundred years ago the front of a large army rarely covered a distance of more than two or three miles. In the Russo-Japanese war, in some of the greater battles the fighting front was forty to fifty times as great.

ine enables this to be done. This must be prevented if possible, and it can only be done by meeting the reconnoitering squadron of airships with a stronger force of the same kind. So it seems that Tennyson's vision in Locksley Hall of "airy navies grappling in the central blue" is likely to become a ghastly reality in the next great war that occurs on land or sea.

Already, in view of the tremendous possibilities of useful service in saving life at sea which the wireless telegraph has developed, people are led to wonder that there are still hundreds of passenger steamers on the high seas that are not yet equipped with this most necessary outfit. We say that the world has been slow to grasp and apply the wireless where it is most needed. And so it seems to be with regard to the application of the airboat and the airship to the needs of the naval and military service.

Here, as in England, we are gratified to read the performances of the airboats at the naval review, and perhaps a little proud to find that the Mother Country is getting on so well in this line of preparation for offence and defence. But while Britain has been giving this free exhibition for the instruction of the world, it must not be forgotten that we know very little of what other nations have in the meantime achieved in the same line.

GLASGOW, May 20—The island of St. Kilda, in the Outer Hebrides, has been cut off from the world for months. No Christmas mail has yet been received there. The inhabitants who number 80 souls were starving when the trawler Strathmore touched there. They only had a handful of flour left, and their only resource was sea birds' eggs. The trawler's crew gave all they could from their own meagre stores, and then reported the desperate plight of the islanders. The government is busy now, and is sending help in a hurry. First Lord of the Admiralty Churchill ordered the fleet to despatch a warship to the spot at once, and the relieving ship should reach there on Sunday.

WELSH DISESTABLISHMENT.

The question of the disestablishment of the Church of England in Wales seems for the time to have roused more of angry feeling and sharp invective in the Imperial Parliament than that of Home Rule. The discussion gave to Chancellor Lloyd George a rare opportunity for a bitter retort upon some member of the nobility in which he showed rather scant respect for their blue blood. Disestablishment, in the mind of its advocates is the diversion of church endowments to the purposes of public education. The Duke of Devonshire had characterized it as "robbery of God." "Does he not know," queried the Chancellor, "that the very foundations of his fortune were laid deep in sacrilege and built on desecrated shrines and pillaged altars?"

Here Lord Hugh Cecil interposed an angry protest, to which Lloyd George further retorted:—"These charges that we are robbing the Church ought not to be brought by those whose family tree is laden with the fruits of sacrilege at the Reformation. Their ancestors robbed the Catholic Church, the monasteries, the altars, the alms houses. They robbed the poor. They robbed the dead. Then when we try to recover some part of this pillaged property for the poor, their descendants accuse us of theft—they whose hands are dripping with the
