The Crown Prince undoubtedly has not spared himself in the attempt to strike a decisive blow on the western front. Prisoners state that he did not sleep for three days during the recent offensive, and that he has broken down under the strain. Despite the entreaties of the Princess, the Prince refuses to relinquish his command even temporarily.
