**Is Named To Lead Miners**

GLACE BAY, N.S., Sept. 8 (CP)—Hal (Admiral) Dewey, a veteran campaigner who has played the last three seasons with Shawinigan Falls Cataracts of the Quebec Senior Hockey League, today was named coach of Glace Bay Miners of the Cape Breton Senior Hockey League.

Dewey, a 200-pound forward, is a native of Smith Falls, Ont. The railroad brakeman played in 1938 for Montreal Royals and then went to Cleveland Barons of the American Hockey League. He was in the R.C.A.F. from 1942 to 1945.

Dewey played briefly with Hull Volants three years ago. When Volants folded he joined Shawinigan Falls and was one of their top scorers. A former teammate was Leonard (Moe) White of Montreal, who was playing coach of Miners last year.

Earlier in the season Bill Cowley was mentioned as Miners coach, but the former National Hockey League scoring ace passed up the post in favor of a rink and hockey job at Renfrew, Ont.
