CENTRAL TEXAS DELUGED BY A DISASTROUS FLOOD

Three Days' Downpour—Fifteen Inches of Rain Falls in Four Hours—Railway Tracks and Bridges Swept Away—Towns Flooded Twenty Feet Deep—Loss of Life and Property.

DELUGE OVER CENTRAL TEXAS.

DALLAS, July 26.—(Special).—A deluge has been pouring over Central Texas since Thursday and has not abated.

Three lives were lost at Stephenson and there is much property damage.

RAILWAYS SUFFER DAMAGE.

Within four hours, at Cameron 15 inches of rain fell.

A thousand feet of the Santa Fe track were carried away and a portion of the Arkansas Pass road destroyed.

A PORTION of the new plant of the Charlottetown Light and Power Company is now being operated. At present the 1900 light dynamo is being driven by the large new engine recently imported. The ideal engine is being placed in position and it is expected that in the course of a few days the street light plant will be transferred to the new station. Men are also at work excavating for the foundation of the large engine in the station at the foot of Pownall Street. The new stokers are being operated and are giving perfect satisfaction. In the pump house an engine has been placed for generating air for these stokers. This engine also operates the feed pumps and four feed water heaters and fans. One of the most interesting parts of the machinery is the automatic device for feeding coal, the engine's speed being set by an automatic valve at the feed the boiler is to work at. When completed the new plant will be fitted with marble switch boards and concrete floors.

At the last regular meeting of the Margate Auxiliary W. M. S. the members of that society presented their President, Mrs. (Rev.) W. A. Thomson, who has since left for a new field of labour with a very appreciative address regretting her departure from their midst, and thanking her for her valuable services during the three years she had been President when the Auxiliary had more than doubled its membership. The address was accompanied by a beautiful silver teapot, engraved with the name of the society and the date. Mrs. Thompson who was quite taken by surprise, warmly thanked the ladies for their kindness, and expressed earnest wishes for their future usefulness.

THE steamer Manchester Commerce Capt. Baxter of the Manchester liners arrived in port at four o'clock yesterday afternoon. Owing to the timber being in the dock the Captain declined to go alongside wharf and the cargo is now being lightered on board. At high water today the steamer will be brought to the pier and the live stock will be loaded. The Manchester Commerce is 430 feet long, breadth 48 feet, depth of hold 30 feet and is the largest merchandise steamer that has ever called at the port of Charlottetown. Her outward cargo will consist of 1500 sheep, 50 head of cattle, 400 boxes of butter, 2000 boxes of cheese. The next steamer will be the Manchester Trader and is sailed to our trade as she can come to the wharf without difficulty. This steamer sails for Charlottetown on the 14th of August. The Commerce sails this evening.

THE annual picnic of the Baptist Sunday School came off on Wednesday, July 23rd, was held at Cornwall on the beautiful grounds of Descan Jacob Bain. About one hundred were present including a few invited guests. The affair was thoroughly enjoyable. From the moment of arriving at the grounds until the time of departure every moment was made interesting. Running races, sack races, games, feat of strength, etc. gave an abundance of amusement to both old and young. This was an old fashioned picnic. There was no pay table or any other means to get money. But an abundance of choice food for both dinner and supper. Everybody came early. Everybody had a royal afternoon, and after a vote of thanks with three cheers and a tiger in honor of Descan Bain, everybody started for home while there was still a clear space between the King of Day and the Western Horizon. It is remarkably progressive and successful Sunday School is ably superintended by Mr. W. Newson of Kingston.

RIVER RISES TWENTY FEET.

Little River rose twenty feet in eight hours. The streets of Cameron are badly damaged and farms being flooded.

A TOWN OVERFLOWED.

In Big Springs the water is over the town from four to twenty-two feet. The track for ten miles west has been washed out and bridges are gone. The foundations of brick and stone buildings are damaged and they are expected to collapse.

Herbert Prowse who entered the Charlottetown hospital some time ago to undergo an operation returned to his home yesterday afternoon.

CAPT. Albert M. Miller, second youngest son of the late Capt. James Miller of Tignish, who recently resigned his position as master of scho. Clayola of Windsor, N. S., owned by J. Willard Smith, has taken command of the three-masted schooner Helen E. Kenney of St. John, N. B., owned by Troop & Son, St. John, N. B. The Kenney is a fine vessel of 315 tons register, is now about to sail for Havana, Cuba, from Annapolis, N. S., with a cargo of 300 M. feet of boards and will then trade between ports in Gulf of Mexico and ports in West Indies, South America and Cape Verde and Canary Islands for the next eighteen months. Captain Miller is a young man of 27 years of age late in the employ of J. H. Myrick & Co. of Tignish, and has had two thrilling shipwrecks; one when he lost the scho. Andrew Barnham coming up from West Indies in 1899 in a hurricane and came 180 miles in jolly boat to the Bermudas, and another the dismasting and waterlogging of scho. Clayola in Feb. 1902, in Long Island Sound, and his daring rescue by steamer James S. Whitney of Metropolitan Steamship Line.
