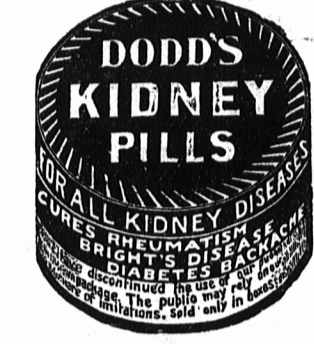

ANCESTRAL MEMORY.

Many persons have had the experience on seeing some place or object for the first time and of then distinctly remembering the scene or the object as if it had been observed before. The ancients of Rome, Greece, Egypt, India and the East found in this one of the evidences of the pre-existence of the individual. Out of it grew the widely prevalent doctrines of metempsychosis and reincarnation still cherished all over Asia. Josephus tells us that among the Jews the Pharisees believed that the virtuous have the power to revive and live again on earth. Various attempts have been made to explain the phenomenon in accordance with modern knowledge and ideas. One so-called explanation is based upon the duality of the human brain. Every man has a double brain just as he has two eyes and two ears. It has been argued that objects once seen and taken cognizance of by one lobe of the brain may afterward be recognized by the other and slower-acting lobe as a memory, though really seen but a moment before. This theory is in many ways unsatisfactory, and we need not pause here to disprove it. Still another explanation has been attempted on the theory that our souls, or inner consciousness, may from time to time, perhaps during sleep, obtain release from the body, go abroad and see things which the ordinary memory does not record. Thus Paul, speaking of a vision he had, says of the experience, "whether in the body or out of the body I cannot tell." And Schiller, the German poet has left this on record: "The immortal soul does not participate in the weaknesses of matter; during the sleep of the body, it spreads its radiant wings and travels, God knows where! What it then does no one can say, but inspiration sometimes betrays the secrets of its nocturnal wanderings." Who knows? Nature is more audacious in her realities than man in his most fantastic imagining. All of which prepares as for the article of Forbes Phillips in the Nineteenth Century, who there sets up the theory of ancestral memory, in other words that incidents or scenes that have impressed our fathers, mothers, or earlier ancestors powerfully may carry their impressions down to us. Perhaps this is about as plausible as any of these attempts to explain a curious fact. Many a child of an early settler has in a dream or a nightmare been led to imagine he was chased by a bear, although he may never have seen a bear, much less have been chased by one. May not this be merely an instance of ancestral memory, something that his father or grandfather had actually experienced? The subject possesses considerable interest to those of a psychological turn of mind.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

ANY even numbered section of Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 24, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less. Entry must be made, personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated. The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans: (1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years. (2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by each person residing with the father or mother. (3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land. Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent. Deputy of the Interior, W. W. COBY, N.
