New Liquor Policy For Ontario to 'Avoid Hypocrisy'

TORONTO, Jan. 23.—(CP)—Atorney-General Blackwell today announced that a new liquor licensing policy for Ontario will be placed before the cabinet and then the Ontario legislature.

Addressing the annual convention of the Hoteliers' Association of Ontario, the Attorney-General said: "In due course, I will recommend first to the cabinet and then to the legislature a liquor licensing policy which will avoid hypocrisy and be in keeping with conditions as they are."

Questioned later, Mr. Blackwell declined to amplify his statement which was construed by some of his audience as hinting at the possibility of introduction of cocktail bars in the province.

Reviewing the hotel licensing policy, Mr. Blackwell said "prohibitionists are a minor pressure group which is of no assistance to any government or agency of government interested in establishing in Ontario social conditions designed to serve the objectives of ordinary, decent, law-abiding citizens."

The policy of the government was to give the Ontario Liquor Authority Control Board full authority over licensing and to remove the question from politics.

The present government inherited a system of liquor licensing which was "essentially hypocritical in that it lumped all types of liquor outlets under the general name of hotel."

Hell's Gate A DEATH-TRAP CONQUERED

Just beyond Yale, B.C., 136 miles up from the sea, the waters of the Fraser River must pass between towering ramparts of rock. This is Hell's Gate, whose walls are only 120 feet apart at low water.

Over the years, huge rock slides partly blocked the cataract of Hell's Gate, making it a deadly barrier to millions of salmon ascending the Fraser to spawn, and seriously depleting the annual salmon run off the delta of this famous river.

By engineering, ingenuity, steel and concrete, Hell's Gate is now only a memory—at least for spawning salmon. Planned and supervised by the International Pacific Salmon Fisheries Commission, great fishways now pass the fish up river by easy stages, with resting pools at each level.

These fishways may well have succeeded in building for Canada a great new salmon fishery, capable of yielding in perpetuity an annual "harvest" valued in the millions of dollars . . . producing tons of healthful food and much additional employment.
