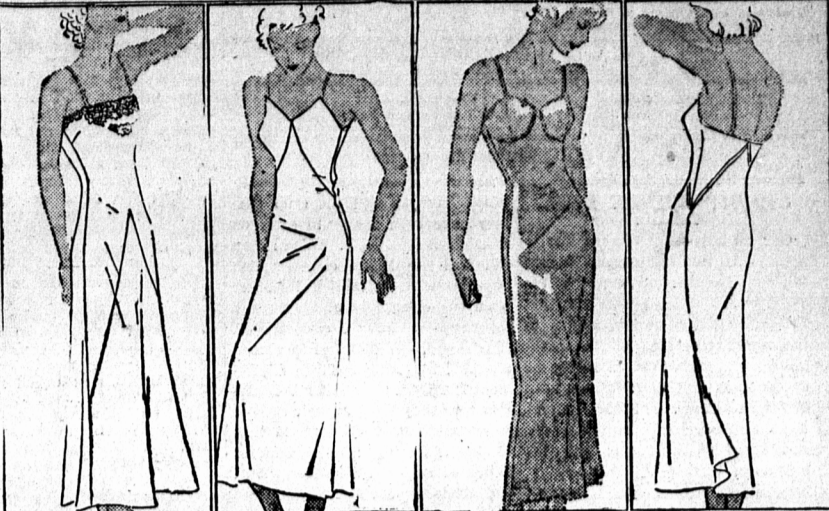

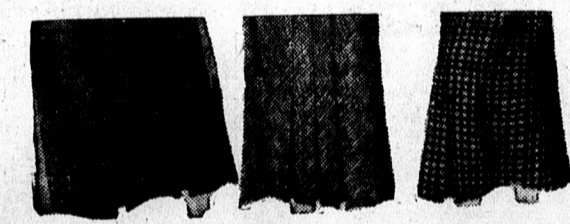

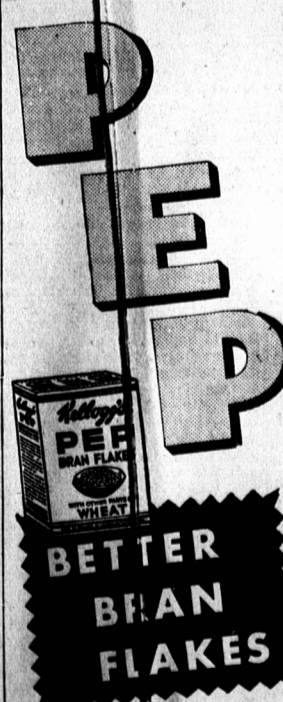

FAMOUS CHOPHOUSE TO BE DEMOLISHED

LONDON, Sept. 19—The George and Vulture in Castlecourt, Birch-lane, London, one of the oldest and most famous of City chophouses, has been given 18 months to live. Its lease expires in March, 1937 when the tavern will be demolished to make way for an office building.

For more than six centuries it has stood on this site. Chaucer came often, as did Sir Richard Whittington. In 1824 Richard Earl of Kent died in the best bedroom. Burned down in the Great Fire, the inn was soon rebuilt. Here Steele, Addison, Swift, Daniel Defoe, and John Wilkes — members of the Hell Fire Club — were wont to meet; here Richard Estcourt, comedian of Drury Lane, founded the original Beefsteak Club. Above all, it was at the George and Vulture that Mr. Pickwick lived, after leaving Mrs. Bardell's apartment in Goswell street. Dickens used frequently to sleep in the upper bed-rooms, but these have long since vanished. Today the Pickwick Club, however, holds its meeting in the old dining-rooms, while many of the members have luncheon daily at a long table in the main room. For some years the ground landlords have been Williams Deacon's Bank, and the property is surrounded on every side by massive commercial buildings.
