**GERMAN FEELING.**

The New York Sun quotes from an article in the January number of the North American Review the substance of a contribution by Dr. Delbruck, Professor of History in the University of Berlin, as to German feeling toward England. This article was written on the eve of the Kaiser's visit to London, and consequently before the seizures of German ships had aggravated the feeling of hostility among the people and press of Germany. At that time Dr. Delbruck found the German people generally antagonistic to the British cause in South Africa, while at the same time the Emperor retained a friendly disposition. Dr. Delbruck admitted that the views and feelings of the Emperor must largely control the attitude of the nation up to a certain point, but thinks that in the end he must bend to public sentiment.

Dr. Delbruck says the underlying cause of German antipathy is the widespread belief that Britain's true motive is not only to the supreme in South Africa but throughout the African continent; that she seeks to extend her African Empire from the Cape to the Mediterranean and that when she has overcome the Boers the German possessions in Africa may be her next booty. The German people believe that the proposal to share with their country the Portuguese possessions when they are purchased or otherwise acquired is a mere hypocritical pretence, and that the end would be a repetition of the fable of the robber who stole a cow and gave his comrade the milk jug.

They believe that Britain cannot be trusted; that with her immense navy and powers of transport she menaces the over-sea possessions of all other nations, and that the time has come when the great powers of Europe should combine against her. It is highly interesting to get from so good an authority a view of the true inwardness of German feeling, which feeling appears to be shared by Dr. Delbruck himself. To a large extent the same feeling prevails throughout the continent of Europe.

The next paper was read by Mr. J. S. Clark and was entitled "The Farmer's Orchards." Many points in the paper were very well taken and a great deal of discussion followed in which Mr. A. Schurman, Senator Ferguson, Mr. Walter Simpson, Mr. Cyrus Crosby, took part. A vote of thanks was tendered.

The third was read by Mr. Cyrus Crosby on "The Libraries in connection with our Clubs" which was considered excellent. Mr. J. C. Clark and Mr. Munn discussed the paper and Mr. Crosby received a hearty vote of thanks. A resolution was moved by F. G. Boyer, Georgetown, and unanimously adopted for the purpose of securing through freight rates between points on P. E. I. to points in N. S. and N. B. A resolution was also moved by J. A. McDonald for the establishment of a Canadian express offices in every town and village throughout P. E. I.

Mr. J. Turner moved, seconded by Mr. J. Wise that a telegram be immediately sent to the Minister of Agriculture at Ottawa, to arrange if possible to have Prof. Gilbert spend two weeks on the Island instead of one as arranged for at present.

Moved by Mr. Cyrus Crosby that the Association send their President Mr. Walter Simpson to Alberton and other appointments. A vote of thanks was tendered Prof. Gilbert and Mr. W. W. Hubbert of the Co-operative Farmer by the people of Marshfield.
