TORONTO, Nov. 2.—The Canadian Northern Railway report issued today shows a net surplus of \$64,823 for the year ending June 30th last. The gross earnings were \$16,360,712. Net earnings were \$4,990,346. The gross earnings show increase of 18.27 per cent., and net earnings 14.37 per cent.
