Annual Meeting of Wiltshire Dairying Co.

The annual meeting of the Wiltshire Dairying Co. was held at Wiltshire on January 9th. A brief review of what this factory has done in the past four years ago, it has grown until in 1926 it was the largest butter factory on P. E. Island, with an output of over 193,000 lbs. of butter. The past year has shown even greater progress as the make exceeded 213,000 lbs. with a gross value of \$78,149.39. It is not known as yet whether any factory has exceeded this amount for 1927. The average price received for butter for the year was 36.66 cents, and the average price paid for fat was 37.96 cents. This difference is considered very good as the overrun is only 12.27 per cent. Cream grading has been followed in this factory, and the result has become quite evident during the past year in the increased fat content of the cream, the average test being 29.89 per cent, a considerable increase over previous years. NORTH WILTSHIRE DAIRYING COMPANY.

At a meeting of the North Wiltshire Dairying Company held Monday afternoon, the following resolutions were proposed by Mr. J. G. McLeod and seconded by Mr. Edson Easter, and supported by Hon. L. L. Jenkins and others:

1. To the Hon. J. E. Sinclair and Mr. Harold Jenkins, M.P.
2. We, the patrons of the North Wiltshire Dairying Association, wish to draw your attention to conditions at the following shipping points on the Canadian National Railways: Clyde, North Wiltshire, Colville, Loye, and Milton.
3. To replace siding removed some years ago on account of placing of third rail. Siding has not been replaced.
4. North Wiltshire.—Stock yards in a disgraceful condition. Remove to south side of tracks, also to have spur track removed to accommodate two more feet for better shipping facilities. Also the telephone to be installed by the C. N. R., as elsewhere.
5. Colville.—To have blind siding changed over to an open switch to accommodate from twenty-five to thirty cars.
6. Loyalist.—Blind spur to accommodate five to eight cars.
7. Milton.—Booking station.
8. All empty cars to be tagged with intended shippers' name attached.
