The death of John F. Worth, City, which took place yesterday morning removes from this city a man much respected as a citizen and a musician endowed with particular abilities. He suffered all summer from an illness, which, however did not prevent him from attending to his daily duties until about two weeks before his death when he was taken seriously ill. Mr. Worth was the son of the late John Worth, and was born in Charlottetown sixty-one years ago. He learned the trade of sail maker from his father, and since then has followed that occupation for many years at Lord's Wharf, and latterly at Peake's Wharf. He was a skillful and capable workman and well known by seafaring men, both in and beyond this province. As bandmaster, Mr. Worth was also very widely known throughout the Island. About thirty years ago he organized the Worth Band, of which three members of the family besides himself, had prominent positions. About five years ago, owing to ill health, he was forced to retire from the position of leader, but he always remained an honored and respected member up to the time of his death. During his musical career he had charge of the 4th and 82nd Regimental Bands, and also instructed a number of bands throughout the Island. Some years ago he was the leader of as fine an orchestra as the Island has produced. He had received a musical training in Galbraith's Band, and was an able and skilled instructor. Today the Citizen's Band which is largely made up of the members of Worth's Band, shows the result of the excellent training received under his charge. There are at present seven members of the Worth family, all relatives of the deceased, in the organization. The late Mr. Worth was thrice married, and leaves a widow and three sons, Herbert in Vancouver, and Frank and Ernest in Charlottetown. The following brothers and sisters survive: Lemuel, Fred and Henry in this city; Sam in Boston, Mrs. Burbridge in Boston, and Mrs. Thos Riggs and Emmeline in Charlottetown. The deceased was an esteemed and highly respected citizen, whose death will be deeply regretted by a wide circle of friends. The funeral will take place this afternoon.
