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THE WEST INDIES MAY BE ASSIGNED TO CANADA

Proposal to Sell W. Indies to United States not Seriously Considered in Britain, but Political Union with Canada Eliminating Tariffs is Suggested.

(Dom. Press Special.)
LONDON, March 8.—The suggestion in America that Great Britain sell its West Indies possessions to America as repayment of part of her debt is not seriously considered here but it is possible the West Indies will be assigned to Canada on the theory that Canada will supply wheat and other products the Indies need, while they send to Canada tropical products—a political union eliminating tariff and other hindrances to mutual trade.

Brother of Dr. McMillan Dies in the West

Dr. W. J. McMillan received a telegram yesterday conveying the sad news of the death of his brother Stephen. The telegram was from his sister, Mrs. Charles Hynes in Perdue, Sask., and said: "Steve had come 1900 miles from the North, to Edmonton and took the 'flu'. He was sick a week and was getting better when he died suddenly of heart failure. He was buried in Saskatoon, Thursday. The deceased left here about 15 years ago. He was 35 years of age and served three years overseas. Another brother, Lieut. M. A. McMillan was killed at Vimy Ridge April 9th, 1917.

100 Skeletons of Missing Soldiers

RHODES, March 8.—Nearly a hundred skeletons of those who are on the great list of missing in the war have been located a few miles from here in the advance trenches near the canal lock of Sapiquele. The bleached bones were found in shell craters and also in territory which was unscathed by the great shells but the thick underbrush has hidden them from view.

Jap Troops Leave Siberia

TOKYO, March 8.—The cabinet has approved the withdrawal of the Japanese troops from Siberia in April. After the repatriation of the Czech and Slovak contingents had been effected, it is expected that the Czechoslovaks will be on their way home by March 20.

50,000 Allied Troops Now in Turkey

PARIS, March 8.—British and Italian reinforcements are enroute to Constantinople and will swell the allied garrisons in Turkey to fifty thousand troops. The main body of British forces have been sent from Asiatic Turkey, Palestine and Egypt to Constantinople, the newspapers said.

UNITED STATES NAVAL CHALLENGE

British Newspaper Scores Secretary Daniels' Plan for Naval Supremacy Calling it Criminally Stupid.

LONDON, March 8.—Condemning the plan outlined by Henry Daniels for making United States navy second to none, the Evening Telegram, owned by Horatio Bottomley, says if the United States challenges Great Britain's supremacy the challenge will be at once accepted. America, says the paper which we were told was written to make war impossible, is to challenge, as Germany challenged in the past, our supremacy on the seas. If Secretary Daniels' mad scheme is carried out, the United States there will be more intense competition in shipbuilding. The challenge once thrown down will be taken up. Let us hope common sense and good feeling on both sides of the Atlantic will prevent this criminal stupidity.

Compel Irish Banks to Disclose Accounts

Prince's Sailing Delayed by Flu

LONDON, March 8.—The sailing of the Prince of Wales on his trip to Australia which was set for yesterday has been postponed a week. The postponement was because of an outbreak of influenza on board the Renova on which the Prince is to make the journey. The Renova has been placed under quarantine at Portsmouth.

ASQUITH'S DAUGHTER A POLITICIAN

Was Instrumental in Electing Father, Now Asked by Ten Constituencies to Become Candidate.

LONDON, March 8.—Lady Bonham Carter daughter of former Premier Asquith, who is given much credit for the success of her father's recent campaign for election to parliament from Paisley, has now received a invitation from ten different constituencies to become a candidate herself. Edinburgh, New Castle and Manchester are included in the districts from which Lady Bonham Carter has not decided whether she will accept one of them.

Gen. Foch Still Mistrusts Germany

PARIS, March 8.—Personally I doubt that League of Nations will succeed in ensuring the peace of the world and the security of France. In any event it will be a long time before it is to do these things, Marshal Foch declared today in an interview. "Germany was neither crushed nor dismembered by the war. She remains a menace to France," he added.

City of Kiel Now Free Port

BERLIN, March 8.—The city of Kiel, no longer a naval base is planning construction of a free port on the Wiker Bay, north of the main town taking the town of Hamburg as a pattern.

LONDON, March 8.—A public gathering at Oxford University yesterday decided to form the Osler Institute of General Pathology and Preventative Medicine as a permanent memorial to the late Sir William Osler formerly of Toronto.

Munich Demonstration Against the Jews

MUNICH, March 8.—The police had to be called out today to quell a demonstration of thousands of persons against Jews here. Citizens accused Jewish merchants of profiting from foodstuffs. For a time the situation appeared serious, but the demonstrators finally dispersed when police officers called in members of the ministry, who promised an investigation with prompt action against any who might be found guilty.

GENERAL GARIBALDI DECLARES ITALIAN ATTITUDE ON FIUME

President Wilson's Theory and the Allies' Attitude are Immaterial, he Declares. What Matters is that Italy Intends to Hold the Territory and will Fight for it.

PARIS, March 8.—The following statement by the grandson of the famous Italian patriot, Garibaldi, was obtained with a view to recording the attitude of that section of the Italian army that has been supporting Gabriel D'Annunzio's Fiume coup. General Poppono Garibaldi is one of the bitterest enemies who has listened to the poet's rant and aided in the early stages of the latter's Adriatic adventure and has unqualifiedly stuck to him since because of his great influence over the Italian soldiery. General Garibaldi's statement is of importance in the possible hearing on future events.

ANOTHER TERRIFIC STORM SWEEPS THE ATLANTIC COAST

A 75-Mile Blizzard Ties Up Traffic in New York City and Surrounding Country. Many Ships in Distress.

(Special to The Guardian.)
NEW YORK, March 8.—A trail of wreckage on sea and land today gives evidence of the strength of the 75 mile blizzard which struck New York Wednesday and which finally blew itself out to sea yesterday morning. While transportation services were stalled in drifts and forced to remain there for hours, milk supplies were held up in cities, signs were blown down and windows smashed in. From out at sea several distress messages have called attention to the plight of storm stricken vessels. The Shipping Board steamer, Gullford, has been abandoned off Narragansett shoals and is at present a menace to navigation. The Captain and crew were taken off by the Pocahontas and later transferred to a destroyer three hundred miles east of Delaware Capes.

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Smallpox Quarantine Has Been Lifted

MONTREAL, March 8.—Dr. Elmer Pelletier, Secretary of the Superior Board of Health for the province of Quebec announced today that the smallpox quarantine of the province of Ontario would be lifted effective midnight Monday night. The quarantine has been in force for the past two months.

FRENCH OFFICERS REFUSED TO STAND

While German National Anthem Was Being Played in Berlin Hotel and General Fight Followed.

(Special to The Guardian.)
BERLIN, March 8.—Refusal of two French officers attached to a French mission here to stand while "Dutchland Uber Alles" was played in the dining room of the hotel Adlon, last night, precipitated a general fight in which Prince Joachim Albrecht, a relative of the former Kaiser, is said to have been the aggressor. The Frenchmen, Capt. Klan and Rougven, were badly battered by the Germans who threw bottles, and the French mission upheld the officers declaring since the occasion was not official no recognition of the German air will be required. It has not been decided if civil or military action will be taken against attacking Germans.

Head of Mission Protested

BERLIN, March 8.—General Nollet, head of the French mission here, today demanded an audience with Herman Mueller, Minister of Foreign Affairs to protest against the attack upon two French army officers in the restaurant of the Hotel Adlon last night.

Portland, Maine, Isolated by Snow

(Special to The Guardian.)
PORTLAND, Maine, March 8.—A snow slide near the Crawford House in the white mountains, which buried the tracks of the maine central railway forty feet deep, contributed to the isolation of Portland. For the first time in a generation Portland was cut off from communication with outside points. It was announced that service on the mountain division would be suspended indefinitely. This line extends across northern New Hampshire and into Vermont and Quebec. Boston and Maine officials say that no trains from Boston could be expected before tomorrow afternoon.

FRANCISCO VILLA ON THE WAR PATH

WASHINGTON, March 8.—Francisco Villa is "on the war path" in Chihuahua, according to official dispatches received here today. March 4 he captured a train near Chihuahua city, kidnapped Joseph Williams, an American engineer and made a speech threatening to take other trains and towns in that section at will, a State Department message received today said. Williams is held for a ransom.

Bohemian Captain Was Suspended

(Dom. Press Special.)
HALIFAX, March 8.—The Certificate of Captain Ernest Hiscoe, was suspended for three months and the second officer, Samuel Backmore, was censured for loss of the Leyland liner Bohemian, which sunk off this port last week, by a court inquiry here this afternoon. The court found Captain Hiscoe did not make sure of his position, did not take soundings or verify his bearings.

The Home of All the Horrors

(Dom. Press Special.)
LONDON, March 8.—A party of British officers arriving at Harbin from Omsk and Chita declare that their experiences west of Irkutsk exceeded all other previous horrors, says the London Times. Harbin, Manchuria, correspondent in a communication dated Feb. 19. Piles of naked frozen bodies of men, women and children were stacked at every station. The correspondent quotes the officer as saying the Czechs took the engines from the hospital trains leaving the sick to perish from cold and hunger.

Conflicting Reports From Bolsheviks

(Special to The Guardian.)
PARIS, March 8.—Alexander Valdevoed, Russian Premier, has accepted the proposal of M. Tcheitcherria, Foreign Minister of Soviet Russia, to negotiate peace according to advices from London. At the same time other reports said the long heralded attack of Soviet armies upon Poland had started. So far it was said the Poles have defended themselves successfully. Polish statements said the Bolsheviks were repulsed with heavy losses. The coming conference of Baltic States, not including Lithuania, will first seek a union of eastern countries, General Pilsudski, Polish leader declared in an interview.

CARSON URGES ACCEPTANCE OF HOME RULE BILL

Ulster Unionist Leader Recommends that Ulster Abandon Opposition to Present Bill. Concession Regarded as Important Development in Situation.

LONDON, March 8.—In addressing the Ulster Unionist Council last Friday, Sir Edward Carson, the Ulster Unionist leader, recommended that Ulster abandon its opposition to the Irish Home Rule Bill and accept the bill now before the parliament says the Daily Mail today.

\$3,000,000 Fire in Norfolk, Va.

NORFOLK, Va., March 8.—Damage estimated at almost three million dollars was done yesterday afternoon at Old Point Comfort by a fire which destroyed Chamberlain Hotel, two large army warehouses and several other buildings. So far as can be ascertained there was no loss of life, although not all of the 200 guests and 170 employees of the hotel had been accounted for and the police and fire department were still searching for them. Number of Canadians were among the guests.

Germans Want Trial By U. S. Court

\$6,000,000 Gold From Canada to
