NEW YORK, June 5-(AP)-Stock prices were battered again today by repercussions from the German offensive in Northern France, leaders yielding one to four points. Steels, motors, aircrafts and miscellaneous manufacturing issues were hardest hit. In the Canadian section Ford advanced a fraction while Distillers, Dome and Lake Shore, International Nickel and Imperial Oil dipped. The Associated Press average of 60 selected stocks broke 3 of a point at 37 1/2, a two-year low. Transactions today totaled 668,240 shares compared with 408,800 yesterday. One of the few exceptions was Standard Oil of N. J. stock, which gained more than two points. Packard also was up. Chief of the losers were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Youngstown, General Motors, Chrysler, Caterpillar, Douglas, Boeing, United Aircraft, American Telephone, American Smelting, Kennecott, American Can, Washington, DuPont, Allied Chemical, Johns-Manville, Owens-Illinois, American Woolen, Electric Boat and International Paper.

Livestock

MONTREAL, June 5-(CP)-The daily market report of the livestock branch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture stated: There were only 18 cattle, 27 hogs and 84 calves for sale on the two Montreal livestock markets today. Calves were strong, and prices on other kinds of livestock remained steady. Good cows were \$6 to \$6.50 and good heifers mostly \$7.50 and common bulls \$4.50 to \$5. Veal calves ranged from \$6 for common kinds to \$8.50 for tops. Medium quality veals were \$6.50 to \$7. Common thin light drinkers as low as \$4.50. The hogs offered were trucked in and were sold at \$18.75 for bacon and \$18.00 for regular cuts on off grades. Hogs sold on rail grade brought \$11.30 hot weight.

GRAIN

WINNIPEG, June 5-(CP)-Fairly wide losses at Chicago and general lack of buying enthusiasm weakened wheat futures prices almost a cent on Winnipeg grain exchange today. At the close quotations were 5-8 cent lower, July at 74 3/4 and Oct 76 7/8 cents. Argentine values were 3-2-3-4 cent down going into the last half of Buenos Aires trading.

CHICAGO, June 5-(AP)-Wheat prices fell about three cents a bushel today to the lowest level since May 18, July contracts touching 78 1/2, the lowest quotation at which trades can be made under present rules. After this break, due largely to nervousness over the new German attack, the market steadied and showed some rallying power. Part of the early loss was eliminated. Wheat closed 1 3/8-2 cents lower, July 79 3/4-1/2, Sep 79 7/8-9/8, Corn 1-8 lower to 1-2 higher, July 69 1/2-5/8, Sep 61 3/8-1/2; Oats unchanged to 1-8 lower.

TORONTO, June 5-(CP)-All index groups registered minor declines today on the Toronto exchange with volume at 182,000 shares the heaviest in a week. Canada Wire, Canadian Breweries pfd, Consolidated Bakeries, Ford B, Goodyear Tire, Massey-Harris pfd, National Steel Car, Tip Top Tailors pfd and Toronto Elevators pfd were down a point or more at the close. British American Oil, down 1/2, was the only loser in the senior oil list. C. P. R., Ford A, Distillers-Seagrams and Walkers common posted losses of small fractions. Papers, steels, and foods were soft generally. Abitibi pfd dropped 5-9.

Lake Shore closed off 1-4 to a new low for 8 years. Dome weakened 1-4. East Malartic lost 15 cents and losses of about 5 cents were noted by Conlaurem, Kerr-Addison, Little Long Lac, Perron, Pioneer, Siscoe and Wright-Hargreaves. A few goods closed up. Bralorne added 10 cents, Central Patricia 3, Canadian Malartic 4 and Hard Rock 3. Smelters and Nickel weakened 1-2-3-4. Steep Rock 5, and Waite-Amulet 20 cents. Falconbridge closed up 10 cents. Wheat prices weakened to a new index low for the year. Home Oil closed 4 cents down, Calgary and Edmonton lost 3 cents, Vermilata 1, Commonwealth Pet 1 and Calmont 3. East Crest also weakened 3-4.

Cash will be paid promptly on delivery on the basis of twenty-two cents (\$22) per pound for unwashed wool. Fleeces should be kept separate and tied with paper twine secured from the undersigned or with common woolen yarn. Do not use binder twine or other kinds of string. Pack in clean bran bags, or better still, in a sack made of bran bags and ticket your name both inside and outside of the sack.

Wool will be sold through the Canadian Co-operative Wool Growers' Association. Limited and if any further amounts are secured in marketing through the excellent salesmanship of this organization, this will be rebated back to each patron as a patronage dividend. Last year, this dividend was five cents (.5c) per pound.

This is your organization. Send your wool to it and receive every cent the market will pay for your product.

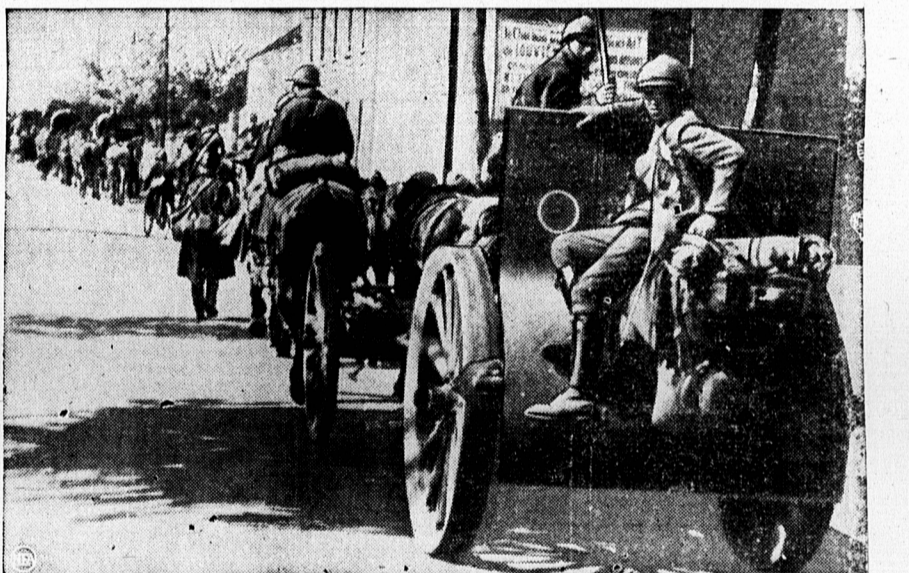
Annual Meeting

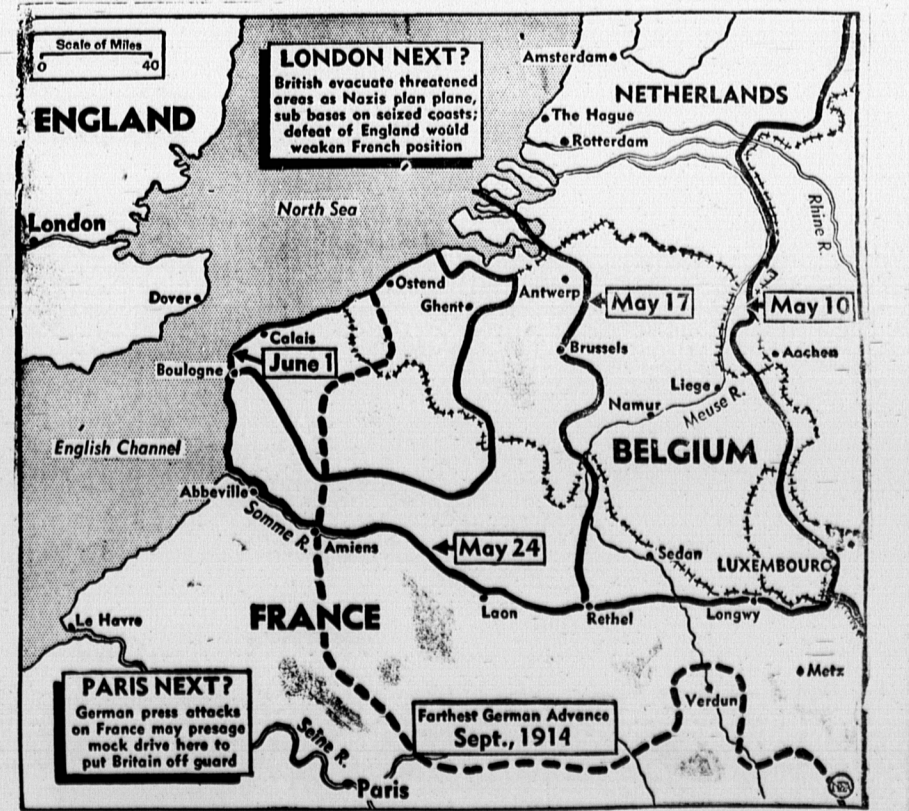

- 1 cup sifted cake flour, 1-4 cups sifted sugar, 1 cup egg whites, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon cream of tartar, 1-2 teaspoon vanilla extract, 1-2 teaspoon orange extract, 4 egg yolks, beaten until thick and lemon coloured. Sift flour once, measure, add 3-4 cup sugar and sift four times. Beat egg whites and salt with flat wire whisk. When foamy, add cream of tartar, continue beating until stiff enough to hold up in peaks, but not dry. Beat in remaining sugar, 2 tablespoons at a time. Sift flour over mixture in small amounts, folding carefully. Divide in two parts. To one, fold in vanilla. To other, fold in orange extract and egg yolks. Put by tablespoons into ungreased angel food pan, alternating the mixture. Bake in slow oven (275 degrees F); after 30 minutes increase heat slightly to (325 degrees F.) bake 50 minutes longer. Invert on rack until cakes are cold.

THREE WEEKS' WAR ENDED, WHAT NEXT FOR ALLIES?



With the closing of the fatal German trap in Flanders on the heels of the retreating allies, the war ends its first phase. The French, pushed back by successive Nazi advances as shown by battle lines at the end of each week, hope to stabilize a front to protect Paris, are broken in now along a line extending from the Somme to Rethel to Longwy and the Maginot Line. Broken line indicates the farthest German advance by September, 1914, after six weeks of fighting in World War I. Meanwhile, the British have established a veritable front along their south east coast in anticipation of German invasion if the war turns that way.
