**Methodist Church Is Growing**

**TORONTO, August 2.**—Replying very definitely to charges which have appeared in the Methodist Recorder, of London, England, alleging that the Methodist Church in Canada has experienced a general decline, Rev. Dr. S. D. Chown, general superintendent of the Church, has forwarded a letter to the editor of the publication in which he absolutely denies practically everyone of the statements.

Exception in particular is taken by Dr. Chown to a recent article by Rev. C. Ashlin West, a Wesleyan Church minister, who makes very definite allegations as to the retrograde action of the Canadian Church and whose statements are characterized by the general superintendents as "preposterous."

Dealing first with the actual number of churches, statistics are quoted by Dr. Chown to show that in 1859 the first year of general conference of the United Church in Canada, there existed 2,944 churches while in 1921 despite the elimination of certain circuits and city congregations which had outgrown their usefulness due to economic and migratory changes, there were 3,315.

This increase is the more outstanding because of the fact that since the union of numerous churches have been affected a great deal of overlapping in many circuits has been abolished.

As to the personnel of the preaching staff, figures again establish definitely that there has been a continual growth also. In 1859 the roster of Methodists in Canada stood at 194,474 and in 1921 the grand total has reached the imposing figure of 400,789 an increase in church membership of over a hundred per cent.

Father Bradley made a touching and eloquent reply in the course of which he warmly thanked the parishioners of St. Joseph's for their kind address and generous gift. In speaking of his homecoming he referred to a great saint who, on returning to his people, they received him not, and said, just think how different have I, underserving as I am, been treated by the people of my native parish who have received me with open arms and given me a whole hearted welcome, the recollection of which will remain a pleasant memory through life.

In concluding his reply the Reverend Father gave his assurance that the living and deceased members of his native parish would always be remembered by him when offering the adorable sacrifice of the Altar and expressed the hope that the parishioners of St. Joseph's would always remember him in their prayers.

Rev. Dr. Curran in his own happy way complimented and congratulated Father Bradley upon his success and in the course of his remarks took occasion to pay a warm tribute to the eleven young men of the parish now in the Priesthood and also accorded a well deserved meed of praise to the eighteen young ladies of the parish in the religious life. He concluded his remarks by hoping that the example of these young men and women would be an incentive for others of the parish to follow in their footsteps.

Father George F. Bradley after preliminary remarks appropriate to the occasion emphasized the great need of Priests and Sisters for missionary work in Western Canada and the Western States and also the urgent calls for Priests and Nuns for foreign missions. He hoped that the fathers and mothers of the parish would give their children every facility and encouragement to enter the religious life, so that St. Joseph's would be known as the banner P. E. Island parish for religious vocations.

Mr. John Bradely spoke briefly

on matters in keeping with the occasion, after which the chair was taken by Mr. Amos Monaghan and a nicely arranged program of vocal and instrumental music was very acceptably carried out. Next came a plentiful supply of ice cream and cake and after all had partaken, the singing of Auld Lang Syne and a general hearty hand shaking accompanied with warm good byes brought to an end an evening of rare enjoyment which will be long remembered by all who had the pleasure of participating in it.

The Reception Committee are deserving of much credit for the attentive and capable way in which they carried out even the smallest details of their enjoyable program.

**800 Retirements Are Involved**

**OTTAWA, Aug. 3.**—By the time the present reorganization of the new Department of National Defence is completed, there will be involved nearly 800 retirements from the three departments concerned. This includes the Air Board, and the Naval Service Department, as well as the Department of Militia and Defence, which are now merged in the new Department of National Defence.

Out of these eight hundred employees, four hundred retired at the end of the first fiscal year on March 31st. Some three hundred have been discharged since that time and it is probable that about one hundred more will be discharged with before the reconstruction is finished.

The Civil Service Commission is now engaged in reclassifying the classes in the Militia Department (the Air Board and the Department of Naval Service, with a view to the merging of the three in the new Department of National Defence. This is expected to take a month yet, and the consolidation will not be put into effect until that time. The act constituting the new department is not yet in force, but will be brought into effect by proclamation when the reclassification is completed.

The saving made in these three departments by the consolidation, will not it is said, appear in the estimates of the three departments all together. The total reduction made last session in the votes for these three departments was nearly three millions, and it is said that there has been a saving of \$650,000 in addition, growing out of the abolition of positions formerly paid out of war and demobilization appropriations.

**Jack and Mary Finally Married**

**LOS ANGELES, Cal., August 2.**—Marilyn Miller, of the stage, became the bride of Jack Pickford of the screen, to-day at the residence of the groom's sister Mary Pickford and brother-in-law Douglas Fairbanks, at Beverly Hills, a suburb of this city.

A brief episcopal ceremony was performed by the Rev. Neal Dodd, rector of the church of St. Mary of the Angels which is the "little church around the corner" to the people of the motion picture industry.

Mary Pickford acted as maid of honor, and the ceremony was witnessed by 19 invited guests and a small army of newspaper reporters, photographers and motion picture camera men. The official guests were members of the Pickford, Fairbanks and Miller families and Charlie Chaplin.

The bride and groom declined to say where they would pass their honeymoon.
