McMillan, of the Customs.

The case of Gregory Hughes was dismissed. A. A. McLean, K. C. appeared for Mr. Hughes.

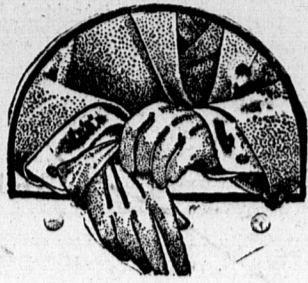
