A meeting of the Souris Board of Trade called to discuss the running of automobiles in P. E. I., was held in Souris on Thursday evening, the president J. A. White in the chair. After a lively discussion in which John McLean, C. H. S. Sterns, H. H. Acorn, F. S. McDonald and H. J. Mahon of Souris and Lauchlan McDonald of East Point took part, the board passed the following resolution: Whereas the running of automobiles on the public highways of P. E. I. is in the opinion of this meeting a public nuisance, a source of danger to life and property, a serious detriment to trade and a continuous cause of alarm to our people when travelling and whereas our roads are in many cases narrow, so narrow that an auto and a carriage could not pass and whereas only a few that is the leisure, pleasure-seeking, moneyed and some of the tourist class would be benefitted, and the large farming industrial and resident portion of the community would suffer therefor resolved, this meeting is of the opinion that our local legislature should enact such laws as would prohibit the running of autos on the public roads of P. E. I., if possessed of the authority to do so and if not to make it compulsory that all drivers of autos should be experts, regulate speed and make owners responsible for all loss directly or indirectly caused.

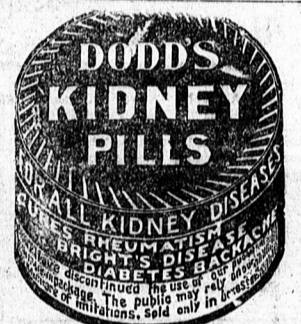
His many friends will be pleased to learn that Joseph Poole, Souris, who has been seriously ill with pneumonia is recovering.
