A VERY pleasing affair took place on Wednesday evening at the Whitney Hotel Sydney when the guests, numbering about 30, assembled in the parlor and presented the proprietress, Mrs. D. J. McLeod, formerly of Charlottetown with a handsome silver service.

On Friday evening a large audience assembled in the schoolroom of the First Methodist church, to hear Principal Newton and the Rev. G. M. Young in their description of Ancient and Modern Rome. Mr. Newton gave a neat, concise and well connected account of Rome from the period of its earliest struggles with Carthage until it attained the zenith of its power under Caesar Augustus. He showed how, fighting at first for mere existence, it was compelled, often reluctantly, to engage in war for the sake of peace until it had made subject to itself almost, all the then known world. Considering the difficult nature of Mr. Newton's subject in its intent and scope, he displayed excellent judgement in deciding what should be omitted and what should be emphasized to make an interesting whole. The Rev. Mr. Young has never been heard to better effect than in giving his impressions of Modern Rome. His approach to the City through a country bare and desolate because of the pestilential Pontine marshes; his surprise on entering Rome to find a City second only to Paris in magnificence and beauty, its grand buildings, some dating from the earliest times; the marvellous tales of the guides; all the wonders, in fact, of his eight day, stay were told in such a way that his hearers imagined themselves making the same excursions, seeing the same sights and hearing the same legends, as the narrator enjoyed. Mr. R. M. Johnson added to the evening's pleasure by singing a patriotic song. A hearty vote of thanks, moved by the Rev. Mr. Raymond and seconded by Mr. W. C. Turner was accorded the entertainers of the evening.
