MESRS R. S. FARQUHARSON and T. A. Stewart were at Tashin Lake on 8th Sept. They had their boat built, also a good raft-boat 22 feet long, sawed all the lumber with a whip saw. Sold part of their goods there as there is a stampede to a gold find 100 miles off. Their cattle are 12 miles out feeding. There is good grass at this place. They hope to be in Dawson about October 1st, being over seven months on the road, the great delay being chiefly on account of the Senate throwing out the Railway Bill which induced them to take this route. They are both very well. Weather fine, days warm, nights cool. Flies troublesome. They are 500 miles from Dawson City, and will take the cattle and all supplies on a raft, and only two of them. It will require strong arms and stout hearts to face such difficulties. There is no mail to or from Tashin, and the boys have not had letters from home since May.—Patric.

Sad news was flashed along the wires to Charlottetown yesterday. And sad hearts were rendered sadder still on its arrival. The despatch announced the death on Monday night at Colorado Springs of Mr. Thomas D. Vessey, son of Mr. William Vessey, of York. The deceased left here three weeks ago this morning with the intention of taking an Arts course in Denver University preparatory to entering the ministry. He was not in his usual health when leaving here, and ere reaching Colorado Springs had contracted typhoid fever which although not preventing him reaching his destination ultimately resulted in his demise. For several days his friends had received telegrams so that his death was not unexpected. Mr. Vessey was employed in Mr. W. D. McKay's store for two years and last collegiate term took a course at Prince of Wales College. He afterwards resumed his studies at Mr. McKay's, continuing there up to the time of his leaving the Island. The deceased had a large number of friends in this city and elsewhere, who admired his sterling worth and manly devotion to duty. He was a member of Zion church and an active worker in the Christian Endeavor. His parting appeal to the members of that society based on the words "what shall it profit a man if he gain the whole world and lose his own soul?" will not soon be forgotten by those who heard it. The deceased was 24 years of age. He leaves a father, mother, two brothers and a sister, grief stricken in being bereft of one who was a dutiful son, a kind and loving brother. The remains will be interred to-day at Colorado Springs. Messrs. Kenneth Macmillan and S. B. Enman, formerly of Charlottetown, are kindly making all arrangements for the burial. 
