

The funeral of the late Mrs. (CARR) Andrew Doyle took place yesterday morning from the residence of her son, Andrew Doyle, Grafton Street to St. Dunstan's Cathedral where service was conducted by Rev. Dr. Monaghan and thence to the R. C. Cemetery. There was a large attendance.

The establishment of a provisional school of instruction for officers and non-commissioned officers of the 4th Regiment C. A., at Charlottetown, is authorized. The school will be opened upon the 1st April 1904, and will be maintained for a period not exceeding two months. The school will be under the supervision of the district officer commanding. One officer and one sergeant-instructor in gunnery will be detailed by the commanding R. S. A., Quebec, as instructor and adjutant, for this school. The commandant, Boy-1 School of Artillery, Quebec, will, at the close of the course, conduct the examinations and issue certificates to those who are entitled to receive them. 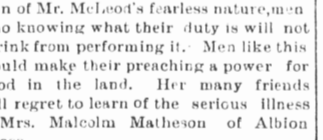
