Mayor Campbell Hoists honor Pennant in S' side

A large crowd gathered at noon yesterday at the Civic Building, Summerside, to witness Mayor Campbell hoist the honor pennant beneath the Pledge Flag on the Town Hall which proclaims to all passers by that Summerside has been in the front of the Victory Loan Campaign. The fire bell announced the event to citizens at noon.

Mr. L. R. Allen chairman for the Town gave a short address and complimented the people on their praise worthy effort, remarking with pride that it was a great honor for Summerside to be the first town of its size to reach its objective. Mayor Campbell also congratulated the citizens, and said that Summerside's achievement indicated the spirit of the people of the British Empire. With such a spirit victory is certain.

Amid cheers the honor pennant was hoisted up. A detachment from the Veteran's Guard was drawn up in front of the Town Hall to witness the ceremony.

Yesterday morning's faures at Summerside ran the total up to over \$240,000, and Summerside is expected to earn more blue pennants.

The drive in the County is pushing ahead and several districts in the County are said to be nearing their objectives.

three is expected next month. Defence Minister Ralston told the House that the recruiting campaign had brought in 32 per cent of the 32,000 men for whom an appeal was issued recently.

Both statements were in answer to questions asked by M. J. Colwell, acting C. P. House leader, who said there was a feeling abroad that "all is not well" with the war effort.

A discussion on the manpower and material aspect of the war effort was part of a busy day which brought several important announcements from the Government, a violent attack upon certain ministers and public men by Jean Francois Pouliot (Lib. Temiscouata) and a discussion of water diversion at Niagara Falls.

Following are some of the highlights of the day's sitting:

1. Prime Minister Mackenzie King announced appointment of Joseph (Thorson) Selkirk as Minister of National War Services, relieving Hon. J. G. Gardiner who held the portfolio with that of Agriculture which he retains.

2. Mr. King, in a general statement, said that the British Government had given the knowledge and desire to the British people to prevent general export to Japan were taken as a safeguard against any incident occurring in Canada which might be construed in Japan as offensive, and not that Japan was looked upon as an enemy.

3. Defence Minister Ralston announced that soldiers on annual leave and embarkation leave would be permitted to buy return railway fares at one-third the price of a one-way fare, the government paying another third and the railways absorbing one-third.

4. Labor Minister McLarty announced that legislation would be presented when Parliament reconvenes to reinstate enlisted employees after they have been demobilized.

Col. Ralston said the campaign amounted to those who had attested shortly before the campaign formally opened.

Mr. Howe used the contents of an address he delivered last night before the Canadian Manufacturers' Association to give the House a picture of the munitions picture today, as compared with a year ago.

More than \$400,000,000 had been spent in construction crown property for the manufacture of shells, tanks, guns, automotive equipment, and machine tools, and total orders placed to date exceeded \$1,700,000,000.

Ship orders had been placed to the extent of \$50,000,000.

Mr. Colwell said he had not made his inquiry to "invite the kind of statement which the Minister of Munitions has just made." He said such statements were not the kind of information the country was seeking.

There was a feeling in the country that the tank recently produced in Montreal was not "off the assembly line" but was "an article made for the occasion."

He did not want a statement that "production has come up to our expectations" but either in a closed or open sitting of the House should be given specific information on our production of equipment.

This was the only parliament in the Empire that had not held a closed sitting and members were no more familiar with the real situation than "any person who would

No new figure of total subscriptions was available tonight. During the day loan headquarters said that \$340,000 had been taken up, and that Tuesday's purchases totalled \$30,500,000, slightly under the daily average of \$33,000,000 needed to reach the \$600,000,000 minimum objective.

Officials said that Thursday loan canvassers will make a renewed effort to bring subscriptions that day up to the \$33,000,000 average.

"Canvassers will direct considerable attention to the possibilities of joining in the parade of victory loan investors through the medium of instalment purchases," a headquarters statement said.

It said instalment purchases can be financed at the coupon rate of 10 per cent or three per cent depending on the length of time to maturity—with no added charges or strings attached to such purchases.

Fifteen Ontario cities reported subscription increases over yesterday's percentages.

Ontario, with an objective of 350,000 individual subscribers, had reached a total of over 140,000 at the opening of business Wednesday.

Montreal canvassers reported enthusiasm for the loan from all sides. Montreal West, residential suburb, asked for its honor pennant today, the first municipality on the island to reach its objective.

Coughawaga, Indiana, who are taking part in the Victory Torch ceremony to be held in McGill Stadium, Montreal, tomorrow night, announced that after a council meeting they decided to buy \$5,000 worth of bonds for the reservation. Two individual Indians also subscribed substantial amounts.

strength" to win the war.

Mr. Mackenzie was unable to attend the session because of pressing government duties, and his prepared speech was read by Dr. K. K. Kay, chief of industrial hygiene in the health branch of the department of pensions and national health.

Also heard at the closing session was Dr. Brinley Thomas of London, England, who said that in a democracy at war, "the authorities must resort increasingly to rationing, priorities and concentration."

Defence Minister Ralston was an unexpected visitor at the morning session, addressing delegates briefly in an appeal for a staff organization in industrial plants to leave army-age men free to enlist.

Mr. Ralston suggested that manufacturers might employ older men and girls, if necessary, to release men for active service. He commended industry for its part in the war effort and said the army had decided to take key-men from industry, but it needed men who could be trained rapidly for mechanical units. Before Mr. Ralston spoke, delegates re-elected Mr. Crabtree as president, and also re-elected Louis L. Lang of Kitchener, Ont., as first vice-president and T. P. Monypenny of Toronto as honorary treasurer. F. P. Lane was chosen second vice-president.

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
