Mr. and Mrs. Moffatt were each presented with a beautiful gold watch and chain by their children and there were other handsome gifts of gold from relatives and friends.

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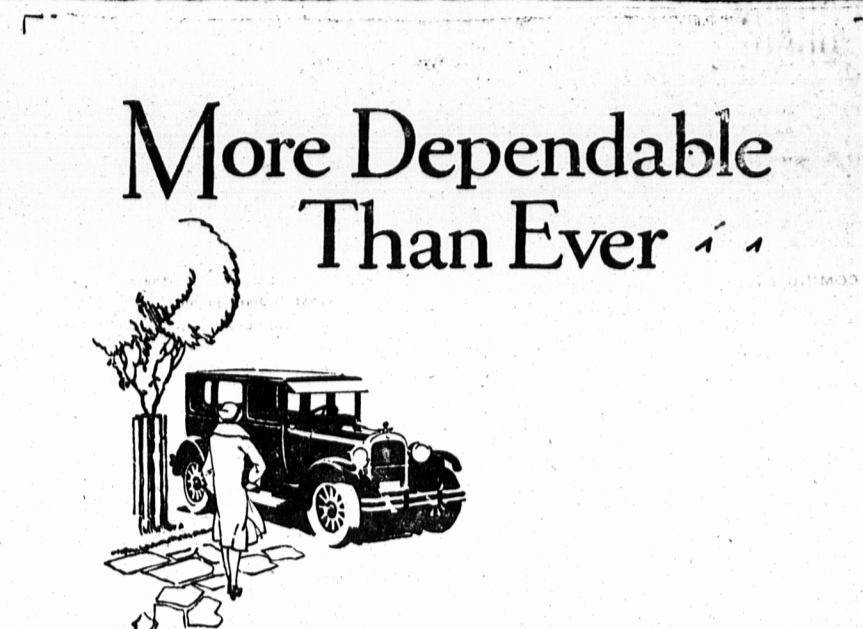
