EDUCATING JAPANESE GEISHA GIRLS

(Canadian Press) TOKIO, Jan. 28.—Japan's geisha girls are going to school. This time the girls are not only studying to learn the classical attributes of their profession, but are studying modern subjects in an effort to stave off the competition of cafes and bars.

The school resulted from the conference and plans made by the National Association of Geisha Housekeepers. Lectures are given at the Shimabara Geisha Exchange.

"If the geisha continues to adhere to the old fashioned traditions of their class they will perish in the wave of modernism which is sweeping the country" declared Tokutomi Kawamura, president of the association. "They must be educated to keep abreast of the times. As a matter of fact, the profession of geisha has never been as poor as at present. "The people are drifting to the cafes and bars as the waitresses in these places are in general better educated and more interesting to the modern youth. They read newspapers and magazines and many of them are capable of carrying on a conversation on current topics. If one

CENTRAL HEATING IN BIG CANADIAN CITY

WINNIPEG, Man., Jan. 28.—Within a few years a chimney on a Winnipeg house will be but an ornamental feature and the furnace a relic of an uninformed and extravagant past. If the vision of the city's best engineers becomes a reality, the municipal central heating plant, tested and found highly efficient and economical in the business section, is about to be extended to a larger residential area and civic authorities believe it is not improbable that eventually the individual heating system will be a rarity. Instead, residences and business structures will be linked up by underground steam pipes with central plants heat will be regulated by thermostatic control as is desired in each building, the smoke nuisance will be reduced and all this achieved at a considerable saving in fuel bills.

WANT TO RESTRICT CHINESE FROM WEARING ENGLISH CLOTHES

(Canadian Press) SHANGHAI, Jan. 28.—A reversion to the wearing of Chinese garments instead of European clothes may be expected if the movement originated here by influential Chinese meets with success. The proposal, made to the Shanghai municipal authorities, is that Chinese men and women who wear foreign-style clothes should be taxed so heavily that they will prefer to wear Chinese raiments. Even northern Chinese, who are naturally conservative have expressed approval of the suggestion which is being adopted by many people who ordinarily may be regarded as style-setters.

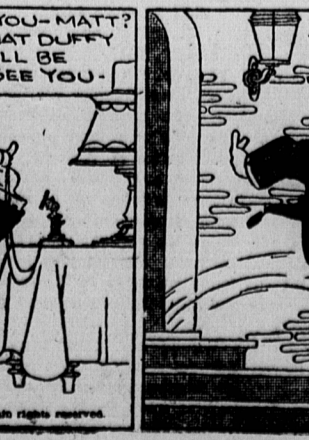
Mr. Wu Chao-Kung has set himself up at the head of the pro-Chinese clothes group. He advocates a tax of \$50 to \$100 for the individual's privilege of wearing foreign style clothes. He has a dual purpose, the first to prevent further "aping" of foreign customs and, second to extend the sale of Chinese goods. Mr. Wu seems to be more interested in restricting adoption of foreign-style clothes by Chinese men than by Chinese women, as few of the latter wear foreign style clothes. Chinese women's dress is extremely attractive, and the women show little disposition to discard it. But men, especially those who have lived abroad, find western clothing more convenient.

The Chinese weekly, The China Critic, approves Mr. Wu's suggestion in some respects. "That foreign style clothing has a definite place in our daily life is indisputable," the newspaper says. "People will keep on using it as long as no better wearing apparel is found to take its place. So the question is not a mere official mandate, but some positive and concrete measure by which certain Chinese fabrics, whether silk or cotton,

Knox College, Toronto, Ont. The last notes from here had a reference to Robert Burns the greatest poet of Scotland, who seems to speak a universal language and be celebrated in all lands where Scotchmen or their descendants have been. Toronto has a large element of these and it seems to me they are on the increase rather than decrease. We have a celebrated Scottish Divine, Rev. Alexander Fraser, spending a couple of weeks in the city, and we had an address in the chapel here which I much enjoyed though the conspicuous Scottish accent made hearing difficult. He is very much pleased at the attendance at his meetings and the final one in Knox Church on Sabbath evening is climax to these. I doubt if the General Assembly that is scheduled to meet there in June will bring such a crowd. He seems to be of conciliatory spirit and held a week of meetings in College Street United Church in which place the terrible disruption occurred on June 9th, 1925, and the Presbyterians adjourned to meet in Knox Church at 12.00 p. m. 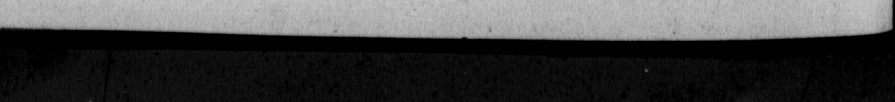

the more I attend the lectures the better I feel at the maintenance of all the old doctrines of our faith. The other subjects are interesting for we are studying the Poetical Books of the Old Testament and a great many people fail to see a wonderful teaching here for our times and all times. Burns and Shakespeare are great poets some people think, but when you place them alongside the poets of the Old Testament, they seem like
