100 FAMILIES LONDON FORCED FROM THEIR HOMES UNDER WAY

Rafts And Boats Used to Transfer Aged People to Places of Safety.

"Let Us Begin Our Work as Friends," Exhorts the British Premier, Who Opened the Discussion.

LONDON, July 21—In deeper gravity, representatives of seven great nations met in the Prime Minister's room in the House of Commons tonight in an endeavor to bring order out of Germany's chaos. Premier Ramsay MacDonald of Great Britain, who opened the discussion, said the colossal sum of \$750,000,000 to \$1,000,000,000 in foreign exchange or the equivalent to more than two years' reparations payments had been sent recently from Germany. Now the confidence of the foreign investor in Germany had to be restored. The problem had both political and financial sides but the conference would concentrate on the financial side.

In A Spirit of Co-operative Goodwill

"We are here," Mr. MacDonald proceeded, "in a spirit of co-operative goodwill, resolved to end our deliberations with an agreement which will not only meet requirements of the present crisis but bring anew a time of candid mutual effort to pacify the disturbed mind of Europe. We are not here to enforce or defeat or humiliate; we are here to understand, to consider our problems objectively; to remember how closely in the essential we depend upon each other and therefore to agree to something which each of us can take to our various Parliaments to explain and get accepted as an agreement, to re-inspire our peoples with confidence and courage to face the heavy responsibilities which are to be the lot of all Governments during the immediate months ahead."

"Let us begin our work as friends," Mr. MacDonald pleaded, "as a real round table conference energized by the will to succeed. And never fear for a moment but that we shall have the support of the people."

Mr. Laval of France stated the position of his country in the discussions which are to ensue and expressed the hope of loyal cooperation with France and Germany for the restoration of confidence and credit in the world. Chancellor Bruening of Germany was grateful for the opportunity of participating in Paris conversations. He urged the necessity of assistance in relieving the situation in Germany.

Chancellor Bruening presented his country's plight, giving statistics to show how far the Reich has travelled along the road to financial ruin, delineating the measures which have been taken to meet the situation and urging the necessity of immediate assistance.

Foreign creditors should cease withdrawing their credits from Germany, he said, and pleaded for a loan of \$750,000,000 and the continuation of short term credits amounting approximately to another \$125,000,000.

Combined Standing Fields and Threshed Grain Competition, 1931

Cash Prizes for Field of Oats, Wheat, Barley and Certified seed potatoes.

There will be competitions in the three counties where there are five or more entries each for wheat, barley, oats, and for potatoes grown from certified seed.

The number of Prizes in each County will be proportionate with the number of entries. Prizes will be paid according to the combined score of the standing field and the threshed grain.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. A field of Oats shall consist of at least five acres, of wheat and barley three acres, of certified seed potatoes four acres.
2. An entry fee of \$1.00 shall be charged for the first, and fifty cents for each additional entry of grain, and \$1.00 for each entry of potatoes.
3. The entry fee shall accompany the application.
4. Entries should be made to the Department of Agriculture not later than August 10th, 1931.
5. REGISTERED SEED ONLY.

The field of Oats entered for inspection must be seeded with Registered Oats. Owing to the change in the regulations made by the Seed Branch, Ottawa, fields seeded with registered Oats will not be eligible for the competition.
