716 CIVIL SERVANT DISMISSALS

OTTAWA, March 29—A total of 716 civil servants were dismissed or have resigned since the present Government took office in November, 1935, a return tabled today in the House of Commons said. Of that total 55 were seasonal and 94 temporary positions. Seven persons were noted as having resigned.

The greatest number of dismissals took place in the postal service, where 347 persons were separated from their positions.
