The levee du corps at the house was made by the pastor, Rev. J. J. McDonald. Then the procession headed by cross bearer and acolytes, followed by a strong choir wended its way to the church where a Solemn High Mass of Requiem coram episcopo was celebrated by Father John J. The deacon and subdeacon of the Mass were Revs. T. Campbell and J. H. McDonald, while Rev. Dr. Campbell and Rev. Mathias Smith assisted the Bishop at the throne. The ceremonies were most gracefully directed by the Rev. Dr. McLellan of the Cathedral. The last absolutions were performed by his Lordship Bishop McDonald. The pallbearers were Dr. Alex. McNeill, Dr. Dan McKay, Dr. Sutherland, Dr. Houston, Dr. Ed. Gillis, Dr. McGulgan. The choir under the direction of John McIvor, was greatly strengthened by the addition of Father McLellan, Dr. McLellan, Prof. Whitney and H. E. Arsenault, of Summerside. The funeral oration by Father John J. McDonald, of Kinkora, was a great effort. He spoke from his heart. He alluded to the love he had for his chosen profession, the success he met with, and the sympathy he always showed in the sick room. He spoke of his deep spirit of faith and his deep spirit of piety. In him the pastor of Kinkora lost a close personal friend. Dr. Gallant was a nephew of the late Archbishop O'Brien, of Halifax. 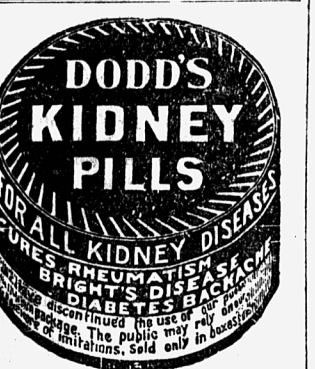

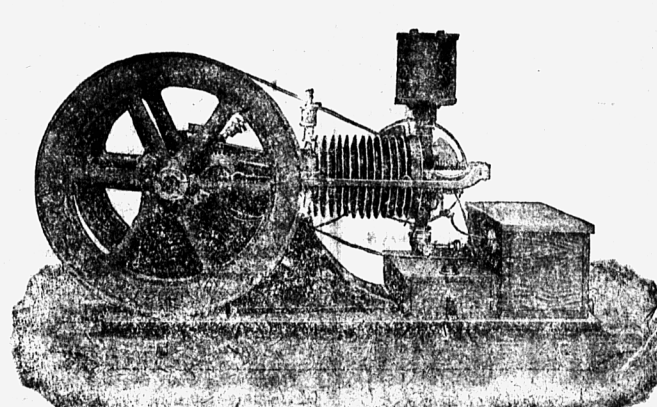
