C. G. I. T. Conference

The first distinctly provincial conference for Canadian girls in training on Prince Edward Island was held in Summerside from October 2nd to October 4th. A large number of delegates were registered, the following places being represented:

Kensington 6, Summerside 45, Central Bed-que 3, Victoria 3, Charlottetown 26, Freeport 3, Murray Harbor 3, Murray River 3, Borden 2, Hamilton 2, Searlton 1, Bidford 2, Montrose 2, Alma 3 and Montague 7—making a total of 115. The delegates were met at the train by a committee of Summerside ladies and taken to their homes.

The first meeting of the Conference was held in the Epworth Hall on Friday evening at half past seven. After a singing led by Mrs. Elma Jamieson, one of the Conference leaders, the Conference service of worship "Dreaming True" was led by Miss Trotter, under whose supervision the Conference is meeting.

The visiting delegates were very heartily welcomed by the Summerside girls, who were followed by an election of officers for the year. Mabel Matheson of Charlottetown was elected Conference President and Adele Read of Borden Conference Secretary. At a later session the Rogers of Kensington, who was elected for this office, as Adele Read had to go home. The theme of the Conference this year was "Dreaming True," and the next thing on the programme was the telling of stories of some of the girl dreamers of the past generation by Norma Jamieson, Peggy Campbell, Mabel Matheson and Marion Trotter. After a short talk by Miss Trotter the session adjourned with the closing benediction.

The second session of the Conference was held on Saturday morning at half past nine. It was given over entirely to discussion groups, the delegates having been divided into the groups under the leadership of Miss Trotter, Miss Inman, Mrs. Howe, Miss Fullerton, Miss MacNair, Mrs. Patterson, Mabel Matheson, Bessie Giddings, Norma Jamieson and Mildred Cox. The discussion was under two headings—making the girl God meant and making the girl God meant. Such subjects as a girl's honor, dishonesty in school work, her ideals of friendship, her attitude toward home duties, her behavior in public and her attitude toward reading, out of door pleasures and sportsmanship. At the close of the discussion all entered heartily into group games which were conducted by Miss Inman.

The afternoon session on Saturday was held in the Baptist Sunday School Hall at three o'clock. Reports from each of the discussion groups of the morning were read, giving the conclusions arrived at by the various groups. "Dreams from Camp" by some of the campers followed, in the nature of songs, stories and stunts, which were enjoyed by all present. To the old campers they brought back many pleasant memories and those who have not yet had that pleasure and privilege were given a small glimpse of what a wonderful thing a C. G. I. T. Camp really is. After announcements by Miss Trotter the meeting adjourned.

The banquet was given at half past six in the Epworth Hall at half past six. A banquet was given the delegates through the kindness of the Summerside ladies. After supper Miss Mary Cairns moved a hearty vote of thanks to those who had made the event possible. The World Dream: Peace—Proposed by Audrey Taylor and responded to by Bessie Giddings.
The C. G. I. T. Dream: The Girl God Meant—Proposed by Miss Trotter and responded to by Miss Inman. Miss Inman's response, which brought the evening's session to a close, was both helpful and interesting. With the singing of "Taps" the meeting adjourned.

The final session of the Conference was held on Sunday afternoon at the United Church. Mabel Matheson, the Conference President, presided and the entire service was conducted by the girls. This was the only meeting open to the public and the church was well filled. Miss Trotter spoke on "Dreaming With the Master Dreamer." She stressed the importance of choosing the better things in life even at the cost of what may seem at the time to be a sacrifice. Through the address she chose the better part, until we set the Cross up in the heart!" seemed to come as a challenge to forsake the lesser things and, with the Master Dreamer, climb the highway which leads to Life Abundant. Miss Doris Tait sang "Hushed was the Evening Hymn" very sweetly. With the singing of the C. G. I. T. hymn and the benediction the session came to a close.

The three days in Conference proved to be a real help to those in attendance and served to strengthen the purpose of each Canadian Girl in Training to "cherish Health," "Seek Truth," "Know God" and "Serve Others." To follow ever upward Life's high quest and find through knowing God, our very best.
