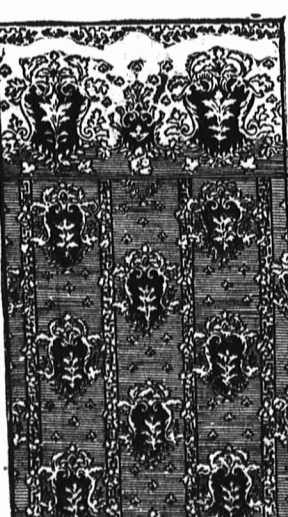

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MASSON HELD RESPONSIBLE

CORNWALL, Ont. March 14.—The inquest into the death of Owen McCourt was held here last night. Charles Masson, the ex-Truro hockey player, was held responsible by the following verdict:—

"That the said Owen McCourt came to his death by a blow from a hockey stick in the hands of Charles Masson during the progress of a game of hockey played in the Victoria Rink in the town of Cornwall, on the sixth day of March, 1907, and that in the opinion of this jury, although there was no evidence of any ill feeling previous to the blow, there is no justification by personal provocation for the above blow at the hands of Charles Masson. "Your jury further recommended that an act be passed by the legislative assembly whereby players and spectators engaged in or encouraging roughness or foul play in a game of hockey may be severely punished."

BUILDING BOOM IN JOHANNESBURG

JOHANNESBURG March 16.—Johannesburg has added to its assets during the last year buildings to the value of nearly \$6,250,000 or about three times as much as Cape Town, which is a city of greater proportions. But large as the Johannesburg figure is, it tells in reality a tale of organized and the building trade is still organized on the scale which they present and the sudden fall of building operations on the highest their former proportions seems for much of the unemployment and suffering which at present exist in Johannesburg. Trade experts in the Colony express the opinion that the Transvaal is both overstaffed and overstocked.
