The members, to the number of about fifty of Prince Edward Lodge, I. O. O. F. celebrated their 92nd anniversary by parading yesterday morning to the Methodist church, where the pastor, Rev. J. Strothard, (a member of Prince Albert Lodge, Moncton) preached to them a splendid fraternal sermon, taking as his text the two words "Our Father," Matthew 6:9. In opening his address he referred to the great work being done by this order by giving a few statistics from the last report of the Sovereign Grand Lodge. In the course of his sermon he showed how all the teachings found in the work of the order traced back their origin to the words of his text and that their motto, Friendship, Love and Truth, could not be faithfully carried out by the brethren unless their work was closely allied with the spirit of the text.—S.

In the Methodist Church, Summerside last evening the pastor, Rev. J. Strothard, preached a strong and forcible sermon on the "Ne Temere." Rev. Mr. Strothard dealt with his subject in a masterly manner, touching on many points concerning the decree with effect. He made reference to the British North America Act and its powers in the different provinces, all of which were affected by the new papal decree. He explained that Quebec was privileged by that act to destroy the right of every sect but one; the right to brand a woman as a prostitute or her children as illegitimate because of the minister at the marriage ceremony; or of setting up two standards of moral morality in Canada. He defined the moral question in the issue to resolve itself into a matter of supremacy of the British Sovereign or of the Pope of Rome and, concluding asked who should reign King George V. or the Pope.—S.
