Record Races At New Annan

The Great Charlottetown Horse Our Colonel Shows Remarkable Speed.

New Annan has a name for putting on real sporting shows something out of the ordinary and promoter "James Pendergast" must have felt pleased as he saw how that reputation had been the means of bringing together over three thousand people to the New Annan Races. People were present from all parts of the province also Nova Scotia and New Brunswick and they all pronounced the races the most exciting they had seen for years. There was great interest taken in the Free For All the people realizing that they were going to see really worth while racing. Peter Farren Maritime champion and record holder and reputed to be the fastest horse in Canada was to meet Our Colonel 2.03 1/4 our fastest horse. The horsemen knew that the "Colonel" was "cherry ripe" but few realized that he would give Peter Farren (the conqueror of White Sox 2.03 1/4, Fern Hill 2.05 1/4, John A. Hal 2.03 1/4, Prince Rupert 2.04 1/4, and Badlight 2.04 1/4 in straight heats in his three last races and who has lowered three track records this year) the race of his life and miss winning by the narrowest of margins. Our Colonel stepped the third heat in 2.16 1/4 which is fast time and a record for New Annan track. If these horses can be brought together again in the near future it would mean a record crowd and intense interest. The "Colonel" was short of fast racing work not having competed since Kensington, July 9th but the race of yesterday should key him up to fine form.
