Women's Typical Aircraft Wardrobe Light and Smart

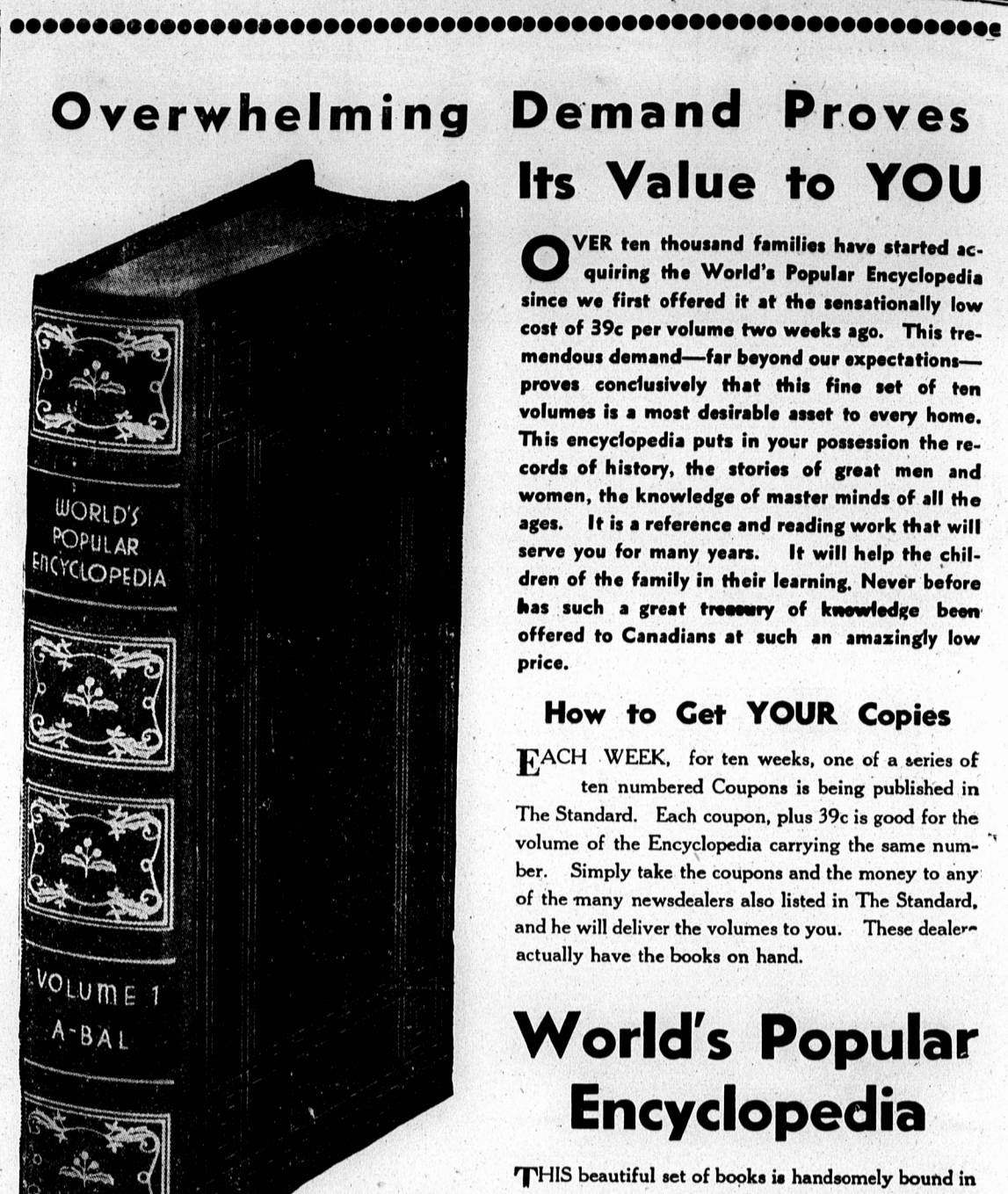

They say that travel by air should appeal to women as it is comfortable to the body, is so luxurious and is clean and fast. Women finish plane trips more refreshed physically and mentally than by any other type of transportation.

Here are the results of the sartorial research: Regardless of the season, mllady can wear her smartest suit or street dress because thermostat control keeps temperature in the plant at an even level in any weather. Business or pleasure-bound women passengers often wear warmes like this: tailored suit or wool dress, street shoes, purse, hose, gloves, hat; light topcoat or fox scarf which may be worn in the evening with a dinner dress.

For the most part, women are more sensible about their baggage when they travel by plane than are men. They take the new lightweight luggage that makes airplane travel less bothersome and avoids paying extra charges for excess baggage. Moreover they choose dresses and colors that give them a variety of smart ensembles with the least number of articles of clothing.

Tension Eases

In London

LONDON, Sept. 22 - (C. P. Cable) - The ordinary man in London showed relief over Czechoslovakia's acceptance of the Anglo-French plan although he expressed his sympathy with the republic facing dismemberment.

While disapproval was expressed over Chancellor Hitler's tactics and some denunciation for Premier Chamberlain's failure to obtain better terms at Berchtesgaden the average man, with the crisis bearing down upon him for two weeks, seemed glad enough Britain would not have to fight any one. Despite efforts to whip reaction against the terms by opposition political circles, the average Londoner remained sorry—but stolid.

Many telephone newspapers protesting against the acceptance of

Hitler terms, but they were probably the habitual writers of letters to the editor.

The News Chronicle (Liberal) which published some comments telephoned to its offices listed these: "This is a most frightful humiliation... makes me feel dirty... Mr. Chamberlain should not fly to Hitler this time—he should crawl."

Sir Oswald Mosley's British union of Fascists plastered the city with handbills calling for no war. Communists called loudly through the "daily workers" and in speeches for aid for Czechoslovakia. There were occasional demonstrations by Fascists and leftists but few clashes were reported.

The working man spent his spare time in his unusual pursuits of gossiping, drinking a mug of beer, an talking sport, but many more were heard discussing the foreign situation than when the crisis first began. Many expressed the view "we will have to fight eventually," but few seemed to wish to participate in such a situation.

The crowds appeared of normal size though corner groups on quiet streets were a little bigger.
