CANUCKS EXPLORE OLD LONDON TOWN

MANCHESTER, Feb. 8—(CP)—The Canadian troops' "invasion" of London is welcomed by the blacked-out capital, and the visitors themselves are enjoying sightseeing under strange conditions, according to the London correspondent of the Manchester Guardian. He says: "The word 'Canada' on a soldier's sleeve seems to enlighten the London street as he passes through, and there are many such enlightenments, for with dogged enthusiasm the men are sightseeing. They tend to go about in twos and threes and they say they are having a good time. These one meets tramping into the empty city are pleased to have Fleet Street's historic buildings pointed out. It is rather difficult to find their way to places they say, adding, without complaint, that

London is a "crooked town." Another pair who had two hours' leave to "do" London thought they were lucky to find so much of interest around Whitehall but they decided Buckingham Palace was too far off. One of the men most disappointed was a Canadian soldier who stood sadly in the middle of the road, looking at the boarded-up statue of Eros. He had come specially to climb the statue, because he understood that was the custom in the West End. "I shall have to return when the war is over," he said.

CLEAN STORAGE BINS BEST FOR TURNIPS

Flies of the genus Hylemyia are pests of the turnip crop in the Eastern Provinces. They deposit eggs about the young seedlings in the spring. The maggots from these eggs attack the tap roots of the young plants, and are one of the causes of uneven stands of plants. This, to a considerable extent can be overcome by cultural methods. The eggs of later generations during the summer form tunnels on the outside of the growing turnips. These tunnels, while actually small, are breaks in the skin of the turnip and as the turnip grows they are widened into unsightly scars. Usually the maggots of the previous summer generation change to the pupae or resting stage in the soil before the roots are pulled in autumn. Sometimes, however, they are not fully developed at the time of harvest and are carried into the storage cellars where they complete their development, leaving the roots, and change to pupae in the debris in the bottom of storage bins. CANADIAN FRUIT TRADE

The primary function of the Fruit Vegetables, Maple Products and Honey Division of the Dominion Department of Agriculture is administration of the Fruit, Vegetables and Honey Act, the Meat and Canned Foods Act (Fruit and Vegetables), and the Maple Sugar Industry Act, which deal with the grading, packing, marketing, inspection, shipment and sale of such products in export, import and interprovincial trade. Provision is also made under the Fruit, Vegetables and Honey Act for the licensing of commission agents, dealers and brokers with respect to ethical trade practices in the fresh fruit and vegetables industry. A commercial inspection service covering import and export of fruit and vegetables and honey is provided for the trade, inspections being made on request and fees for such inspection being charged.
