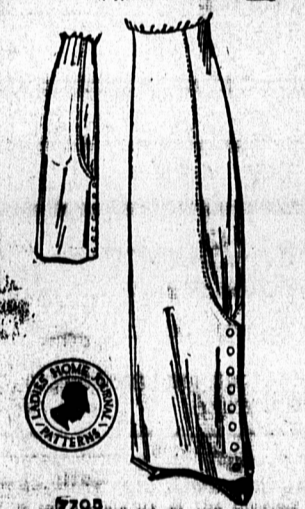

With the popularity of the top-coat and the separate blouse it is quite necessary one should have an extra skirt or two.

No. 7705 is a four-gored model with a slightly raised waistline and just a suggestion of drapery on each side.

Cheviot, serge or tweed are excellent if the skirt is intended for general or business wear, while ratine, cloth or duvetyne may be used if it is desired for dressy occasions.

A practical idea for the woman who makes her own clothes is to always have a skirt on hand of cambric or other light material that is just right in length by which to measure the length of her gowns and skirts. This will save much time. As one hip in most figures is slightly larger than the other, the skirt is apt to sag a bit on one side if it is carried up evenly all around and no attention given to this difference.

This skirt may be made in size 24 with 2 1/2 yards of 36" wide material. The pattern is cut in 5 sizes; 22 to 30.

The second item was a beautiful vocal solo by Miss Hazel Moran, who received great applause. Mr. Patrick McTague, of the Pastime Club, gave a declamation in his well known inimitable manner which fairly took the house by storm. Mr. J. Austin Trainor, that well known comedian and public entertainer, sang that old favorite "Father O'Flynn" in fine voice and was compelled to respond to an encore. For a second number he gave a dramatic recitation in which he demonstrated to good advantage his excellent qualities as a dramatist. THE DUTY OF THE SCHOOL DOCTOR

Dr. Mumford, who is the medical officer of the Manchester Grammar School had as his object at a recent conference of teachers in Bradford, England, "Some physical factors necessary in higher education." He expressed his sense of the value of medical inspection in the elementary schools, one important result of which, he said, had been an immense increase in sense of responsibility on the part of parents. The duty of the school doctor was to find out what amount of driving-power there was in the child, for a great waste occurred when the teacher endeavored to make the child do something which it had not the physical force to accomplish. It was the experience of most medical officers of public elementary schools that the greater proportion of disability, inefficiency and backwardness in children was due to the effect of insufficient nourishment, insufficient sleep, and incomplete recovery from many still prevailing and preventable diseases. Inadequate mental deficiency accounted for less than 2 per cent. of the backwardness; incompletely cured disease for from 30 to 50 per cent. of it.

Coming then to the central subject of his paper Dr. Mumford said that though theoretically higher education or formal education, during adolescence should be free to all, yet practically many children were so unfit physically, as the result of home and other conditions, that they were more likely to be injured than to be benefited by a prolonged course of indoor study for three or four or more years after the age of thirteen. It was doubtful whether as many as 7 per cent. of the present school population was capable of benefiting by a course of study extending through adolescence. Dr. Mumford emphasized strongly the need for good home conditions. If, he said, we wanted to increase the 44 per cent. of children now passing from elementary to higher education, the first requisite was to improve the home and widen the interests and outlook of the parents.

CANDLES TO HARMONIZE WITH DECORATIONS.

You can have wax candles or any shade of any color you may wish by mixing oil tube paints of the desired color with melted paraffin and dipping the candles in this. For light shades use white candles for dipping. Unless the vessel is quite large better results may be obtained by pouring the wax over the candle held in an upright position. Keep the paraffin melted by setting it in a pan of hot water instead of directly over the blaze.

FOR MAKING STOCKINGS.

If you mark stockings with the Cash Initial or name tapes, you can easily mark them in pairs by the method of sewing. Sew two tapes horizontally on the top of the garter band to mark one pair, and fasten down on the band for another, and midway for the third. On the fourth pair make the tapes vertical, and on the two other pairs run oblique tapes, one from right to left and one from left to right. Thus the six pairs are accounted for with no extra labor. To tell silk stockings from lisle ones at a first glance, use a different style of letter. If you have used script for your lisle stocking, choose Old English for the silk ones.

A FUDGE SECRET.

Instead of cooking fudge until it spins a thread or forms a ball in cold water, as so many recipes call for, I have found it much better when cooked only five or six minutes and then beaten until thick and creamy. A pleasing addition to fudge is half a marshmallow dropped on each square while still hot.

PRACTICAL DRAW STRINGS.

To prevent draw-strings from pulling through sew a crochet button on each end of the tape or ribbon a little larger than the hole through which the ribbon was pulled. These will make a neat finish also. The buttons can be obtained for a small amount if you look through the odds and ends at a button counter.

This gives a perfectly smooth surface, which is fresher than any other thing could be. The drawers look neat and attractive, and when cleaning is desired a simple wiping with a lamp cloth produces a perfect cleanliness. I have carried out the same idea with all the shelves, cupboards, and drawers in the house, whether of birch, china, or kitchen utensils, and find them more easily cared for when arranged with other covers. This really makes a good substitute for the highly recommended glass shelves.
