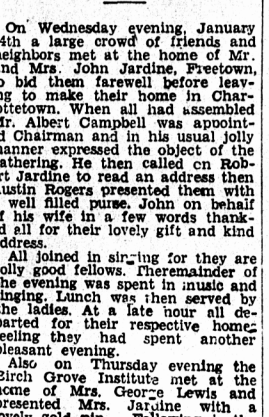

Gave His Life Address and Presentation For Freedom



Reg. No. G-50379 Pte. John Lafferty who died of wounds received in action on the Western Front, John enlisted with the North Shore N. S. Regiment in 1943. After taking his training in N. B. and a special course in Ontario he went overseas in April 1944. Engaged in fighting in Belgium and France. He was fatally wounded Dec. 11, 1944 while on night patrol by a mine explosion. He was taken to hospital where he died a short time later and was buried in a Canadian cemetery a few miles south of Mynegien, Holland. Besides his wife Katherine of 151 Union Street, Saint John, N. B., two brothers, Nantee and Emmanuel in Halifax, N.S. and one sister, Mrs. George Brazil of Roxbury, Mass., survive. May his soul rest in peace.

Wounded in Action



Staff Sgt. W. W. Strickland, West N. S. Regiment, who joined up in August, 1939, and went overseas in 1940. He was 19 months in Italy and was wounded Jan. 4, 1945. Staff Sgt. Strickland, who is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Rufus Strickland of Mansfield is now in hospital in Italy wounded in his both legs. Mr. and Mrs. Strickland have a second son, Curtis, now in Belgium who was wounded but is back in the lines.
