**POLICE COURT**—In the Police Court yesterday, a remand order appeared and his case was dismissed.  
**FIREMEN OUT**—Firemen were again called to the scene of Saturday's disastrous fire last evening when smoke began rising from the ruins of the F.W. Woolworth store. A stream of water was played on the spot for about half an hour. The alarm was sent in shortly after five o'clock.

**QUEEN'S COUNTY COURT**—The case of Elizabeth Ann Lawless, plaintiff, vs. Hubert Roberts, defendant, both of Charlottetown, came before His Honour Judge C. G. Duffy in the Queen's County Court yesterday. It arose out of an action for damages of \$500 for alleged assault and battery by the defendant on the plaintiff. The case resulted in judgment of non-suit with costs.—S

**LEGION DANCE**—The regular Tuesday dance for the men in the form was held in the Canadian Legion Rooms last night with a large crowd in attendance. The Navy, Army and Air Forces were well represented. Music for the entertainment was supplied by Bill Moreside's orchestra and the dance was under the direction of Mr. A. G. Bruce, entertainment officer of the Canadian Legion War Services.

**NO DECISION YET**—Mr. R. J. MacIsaac, regional superintendent in charge of the F. W. Woolworth Company, Limited, who is here from Toronto to appraise the damage caused by the recent fire said last night that no decision to re-build or start the business of the store in the city has been reached yet. This decision will be left to Head Office. The Woolworth interests were completely destroyed by fire on Tuesday. The loss was \$400,000 while the stock and fixtures estimated at \$1,150,000. Ducks were \$1.50 per pound while eggs were 35 to 40 cents per dozen.

**BUILDING SHELTER**—Workmen are engaged at present constructing a temporary shed on the site of the ruins of the Agricultural Hall which was completely destroyed by fire several weeks ago. The new shed is being built for about 200 tons of coal which were housed in the building. At the time of the fire there were 400 tons there since then about half of the amount was removed to public buildings. The temporary structure will be about 30 by 60 feet.

**FUNERAL SERVICES**—The funeral of Mrs. Francis Hughes was held from the residence of her son-in-law, Mr. Wendall McDonald, 48 Upper Queen Street, yesterday morning to the Church of the Most Holy Redeemer where Requiem High Mass was celebrated by the Rector, Rev. A. McDonald. The pallbearers were Messrs. J. F. Leighton, J. A. Griffith, M. J. McManus, Joseph Storey, Alban McDonald and Henry Court. Interment took place in the family plot in Tracadie where the grave was conducted by Rev. William McCabe.

**APARTMENT DAMAGED**—An apartment house on the corner of Water and Haviland streets was damaged considerably by fire which broke out about six o'clock yesterday morning. The blaze originated in a closet in the apartment of Mrs. Jessie Shaw on the second floor. It was confined to the rear of the building. Firemen, using three lines of hose, battled the blaze for about an hour before extinguishing it. The building is known as the Lowden property and was formerly the American Consulate.

**CANADA TEMPERANCE ACT CASE**—The case of two persons charged with the importation of liquor in violation of the Canada Temperance Act came before Stipendiary Magistrate G. J. Tweedy yesterday. One of the accused pleaded guilty and was fined \$100 and costs or two months. The case against the other was withdrawn. The case arose out of the seizure by Royal Canadian Mounted Police, of three suit-cases at the Trans-Canada Air Lines terminal at the Airport early in November. Two of the suitcases were found to contain 43 quarts of liquor which had been obtained in a New Brunswick liquor store.
