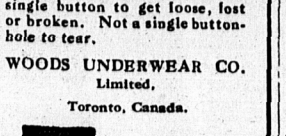

**Mortuary Statistics in British Empire**

(Canadian Press)  
LONDON, May 28—Great Britain's birth rate in 1922 2.4 per thousand was the lowest ever recorded in this country except during the war years according to a report just issued. The same source gives figures for the British Empire showing Manitoba to have highest birth rate and British Columbia the lowest. New Brunswick has highest death rate and Saskatchewan and New Brunswick have highest infant mortality rate, hundred and thirteen per thousand.

**THEIR OWN POLICY TO QUELL STRIKES**

ESSEN, May 27—German officials here today announced that the strike situation in the Ruhr had assumed such proportions that they had decided to ask General Doucet to permit the return of the German security forces to the occupation forces in February. The Germans claim that the presence of these forces is necessary to preserve order in Dortmund and other trouble points, many of which towns now being absolutely without police protection. Thirty iron and steel plants are reported to be closed because of strikes called after visits by Communist agitators who, the Germans declare, sometimes threatened the workmen if they objected to a walkout.
