**No Preaching By Deaconesses**

LONDON, July 8.—The lower house of Convocation of the Church of England at Canterbury today approved of the report of the committee appointed at the Lambeth Conference in 1920 to consider the subject of the work of deaconesses in the church, as presented yesterday but with two amendments which were carried by large majorities. These prohibited deaconesses from reading morning and evening prayers in the church and prohibit them from preaching at church services.

It was finally agreed, that with the approval of the Bishops, deaconesses should be allowed to speak and pray in consecrated buildings to congregations of women and children but not at the regular appointed services.

The House requested the Archbishop to have the measure embodied in a formal document in the committee's report it was recommended that deaconesses be permitted to read morning and evening prayers in the church, and with the approval of the Bishop, lead in church prayer and instruct and exhort the congregation.

**German Bluebeard Commits Suicide**

BERLIN, July 8.—Germany's notorious bluebeard, Kard Grossmann, committed suicide in his cell by hanging today, a half-hour before he was to be taken to the criminal court, where he was undergoing trial for murder. He had admitted his guilt in the case of four women but was suspected of murdering 20, who either mysteriously disappeared or were found horribly mutilated.

Alienists described Grossmann as one of the strangest pathological mysteries known to criminology. Most of his victims were lone women, whom he seized in the woods in the suburbs of Berlin and dragged to his hermit abode, where he maltreated them.

**New Shells For England**

LONDON, July 8.—The United States Navy is buying new secret-process armor-piercing shells from the great Hadfield Armament Company, it was learned today. According to experts of the Hadfield Company, the new shell can penetrate any armor now built or likely to be built for many years.

It is understood that exhaustive tests were conducted by Hadfields here and that United States Navy ordnance officers have also put the shells through satisfactory tests in the laboratory. It is believed that the British Atlantic Fleet is now out carrying on big gun tests on warships off the Devonshire coast is also experimenting with the new Hadfield shells. The ex-German battleship Nurnburg, the British battleship Superb and the British coast defense ship Gordon are being shot up in these tests. In addition, exhaustive tests are being made with airplanes regarding the effect of bombs dropped on and alongside the warships.

**QUEBEC REJOICES AT THE BIG HAY CROP**

Never before have I seen the province gong through such a period of ideal conditions for crops as those which have reigned for the past two months, states a correspondent. The hay crop, the basis of the dairying industry and its prosperity of the province is assured, meaning that the farmers will have at their disposal a crop valued at \$75,000,000.

**ARMY PLANE TO SPRAY FOREST IN THE PEST ATTACK.**

WASHINGTON, July 9.—In cooperation with the department of agriculture, the army air service has formulated plans for carrying on a spraying campaign in New England forests from an airplane.

Capt. R. A. Kinloch on duty with the 1st squadron at Mitchell Field, L. I., has been detailed to this duty.

The outcome of the experiment is awaited with interest by forestry experts.

**CHERRY CROP SO HEAVY THE PRICE LESS THAN COST**

MILTON, July 9.—It was learned today that the crop of early cherries in the Milton district is the largest in the memory of the fruit growers. The crop is so abundant that the cherries are practically a drug on the market. One fruit grower stated that the prices received for the cherries would not pay for the spraying, picking, baskets and carriage of the fruit to market.

**WOMEN IN INDIA**

Since 1907 education among the women of India has more than doubled. The proportion of educated women in 1907 was 23 per cent and in 1920 it was 5 per cent.

**CANADA'S FAILURES**

TORONTO, July 9.—Canadian failures show an increase during the past week according to R. G. Dunn and Co. 75 were reported compared with 58 for the week and 27 a year ago. Of last week's failures, 17 were in Ontario; 31 in Quebec and 7 in Manitoba. Of defaults involving \$5,000 or more in each case, there were 40 last week, as against 24 such failures in the preceding week.
