Britain Wants Evaporated Milk Treaty Extended From Canada

OTTAWA, Oct. 1 (CP).—The war has brought a new responsibility to the 100,000 dairy cows which produce Canada's milk supply. They must provide a considerable portion of the United Kingdom's needs for evaporated milk.

In July the British Ministry of Food ordered 800,000 cases of evaporated milk through the Canadian Department of Agriculture and has work added under 150,000 cases to the order. As it requires about 1.6 pounds of raw milk to make a 38-pound can of evaporated milk, the new order alone will require more than 600,000 tons of milk.

The increased United Kingdom demand is shown in rapidly increasing export figures released by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics in August, 1939. Canada's total exports of evaporated milk were 1,026,700 pounds, of which the bulk went to Great Britain. In August, 1940, exports were 6,128,400 pounds, of which 5,816,000 went to the United Kingdom.

The entire demand from the United Kingdom is for unsweetened evaporated milk. Demand for Canada's condensed milk, the sweetened variety, which is exported to the West Indies, has also jumped from 33,000 pounds in August, 1939, to 541,700 pounds last August.

These figures indicate that concentrated milk products have become a major item in the plant's export trade. In Ontario and Quebec, Ontario produces 75 per cent of the evaporated milk in the war, but plants in Alberta and British Columbia are likely to participate in the rapidly developing market.

In 1938, the latest figures available, only 1.94 per cent of all milk produced in Canada went into concentrated milk. In that year 33 per cent was consumed in Canada as raw milk. But now 85 per cent of the production, or 88 per cent, and the balance went into home-made cheese, ice cream and exports destined toward cheese and cream.

The figures for 1940 will show a concentrated milk.

New Zealand Trade Treaty Extended

OTTAWA, Oct. 1 (CP).—Extension of the Canada-New Zealand trade agreement for a further period of one year was announced today by Trade Minister MacKinnon.

The agreement was concluded May 24, 1932, for one year but has been extended at various times since then, the last extension being in 1939 to Sept. 30, 1940.

Mr. MacKinnon said the order-in-council extending the agreement to Sept. 30, 1941, had already been passed.

The agreement provides for fixed rates of duty on certain enumerated goods imported into New Zealand, and on all other products the benefits of British preferential tariffs. Corresponding concessions are granted on New Zealand's products imported into Canada.

Higher Taxes In U. S. Forecast

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1 (AP).—The United States Congress sent a compromise excess profits tax bill to the White House today amid forecasts in both the House of Representatives and Senate that still further taxes would be levied early next year.

The bill's draftsmen estimated that it would yield \$250,000,000 in 1940 income, including \$20,000,000 from an increase in the Normal Corporation Tax, and from \$900,000,000 to \$1,000,000,000 in 1941 income.

In addition to the tax provisions, the legislation also contained clauses designed to speed up the defence program. These would suspend existing profit limitations on government contracts for construction of warships and airplanes and permit corporations to charge off against earnings over a five-year period the cost of new defence manufacturing facilities completed after June 10, 1940.

Included also was a section under which conscripts and other members of the armed forces may obtain low-rate government life insurance. Designed originally to hold in check the profits that might accrue to industries in the sale of national defence items, the completed legislation also would depend for a substantial addition of its revenue upon a normal corporation income tax of 31 per cent. This change would increase the rate for these corporations to 24 per cent.

A tax of from 25 to 50 per cent would be levied on profits defined in the bill as exceeding normal.

SMALL SHIP FIRMS QUIT

Small shipping firms of Japan are rapidly going out of business or coming under control of a major shipping concern, it is stated in Tokyo. Japan's ship-owners have been raiding their brains for ways to acquire ships to meet their needs. No ships are being sold. Large shipowners are chartering the ships owned by small companies. But this is not always possible. Many of the smaller concerns prefer to operate their own vessels. Faced with this problem, the big companies are buying up the shares of the little companies to bring them under their control.

George Cross Awarded To Lieut. Davies

LONDON, Oct. 1 (CP Cable).—The George Cross, instituted by the King as a mark of honor for extreme gallantry, was awarded today to temporary Lieutenant Robert Davies, formerly of St. Catharines, Ont., who led a section of the Royal Engineers in removing the giant time bomb which threatened to destroy St. Paul's Cathedral.

Sapper George Cameron Wylie of the Royal Engineers, who helped dispose of the 1,200-pound missile, also was awarded the G. C.

The official announcement, published in the London Gazette, said of Lieut. Davies: "So conscious was this officer of imminent danger to the Cathedral that, regardless of personal risk, he spared neither himself nor his men in their efforts to locate the bomb."

"After unremitting efforts, during which all ranks knew that an explosion might occur at any moment, the bomb was successfully extricated. In order to shield his men from further danger, Lieut. Davies placed himself in the vehicle in which the bomb was removed and personally carried out its disposal."

The announcement continued: "It fell to the lot of Sapper Wylie to do the actual discovery and removal of the bomb. Sapper Wylie's untiring energy, courage and disregard for danger were an outstanding example to his comrades."

The George Cross, ranking next to the Victoria Cross, is intended to reward civilians for acts of gallantry arising from enemy action or for other brave deeds.

There is a small military division of the Cross to permit its award to members of the fighting services who have performed acts coming within the terms of its warrant.

It is understood it was awarded Lieut. Davies and Sapper Wylie, who are army men, because of the nature of the job for which they were decorated.

The George Cross was also awarded to Thomas Alderson, detachment leader of rescue parties at Bridlington, for consistent gallantry, enterprise and devotion to duty during air raids.

George medals were awarded to a number of civilians, including air raid wardens, members of the auxiliary fire services, and regular firemen. Included were Mrs. Dorothy Clarke, ambulance driver and Mrs. Jane Heppburn, ambulance attendant, both of Alderburgh.

The medal of the Order of the British Empire, military division, for meritorious service was awarded to Sgt. James Wilson of the Royal Engineers, senior non-commissioned officer of the section dealing with the St. Paul's time bomb.

The same award went to L. Cpl. Herbert Toph, another member of the St. Paul's section.

U. S. Admiral Says "Things Moving Fast"

MIAMI, Fla., Oct. 1 (AP).—Rear Admiral John W. Greenleaf, remarking "things are moving fast" led a joint army-navy mission here today on the way to an inspection tour of prospective United States naval air bases in British Caribbean possessions.

The eight-member mission flew here from Washington today and will leave tomorrow morning for Nassau, capital of the Bahamas.

The rear admiral, chairman of the base planning board, said he had heard of no plans for the Duke of Windsor to accompany the mission from Nassau.

The United States obtained 99-year leases on sites for the bases in Great Britain's western hemisphere possessions in exchange for 50 destroyers. Work already has begun on bases at Newfoundland and Bermuda.

The mission will fly to Nassau tomorrow in three navy planes. After boarding the United States cruiser St. Louis at Guantanamo the military experts will visit Jamaica, Trinidad, British Guiana, St. Lucia, Antigua and San Juan.
