PRAIRIE PROVINCES SIZZLING IN HEAT OF 107, WHICH HAS CLAIMED 8 LIVES

WINNIPEG, July 25.—Prairie people sought the West's great outdoors today for relief from July's second heat wave—and found it scorched by a burning sun. Vainly they scanned weather forecasts that predicted more decidedly hot weather of the kind that has taken a toll of eight lives in Saskatchewan and Alberta since Tuesday. Rising mercury scaled new seasonal heights during the day and approached the all-time record for Canada—110 at Dauphin, Man., on June 15, 1919—at Broadview, is Southern Saskatchewan. Maximum temperature at Broadview was 107, just a few degrees higher than a half-score of other towns and cities recorded.

Grand Jury Condemns Unclean Jail Condition At Georgetown Court

Stresses Necessity of Stricter Enforcement of Motor Vehicle Law With Regard to Reckless and Intoxicated Drivers And Non-dimming of Lights.

The following report of the Grand Jury was delivered at the opening of the Supreme Court in Georgetown on July 21. To His Lordship John A. Matheson, Chief Justice, P. E. Island. We the Grand Jury beg to submit the following report: We wish to express our appreciation of the thoughtful and instructive address with which you were pleased to favour us this morning. In accordance with your instructions we visited the jail and regret that it is not very cleanly kept. We found three prisoners; one here temporarily to give evidence in a case now before the Court; another for petty theft, and the third a vagrant. We think that this man should be in the Provincial Prison instead of being in jail. We are pleased to find that a well being is being visited by the next Grand Jury they will find water for use in the taps and toilets. We have given a good deal of consideration to auto traffic. We know that there is a strong sentiment in favour of having the Motor Vehicle Law more strictly enforced, especially with respect to the non-dimming of lights and reckless and intoxicated drivers. If every driver acted as if he were a very man has just as much right to the road as himself, there would be fewer accidents.

The Grand Jury, for the information of the Public, wishes to learn from the Court if it would be right and legal for any citizen to detain the driver of an auto who may be reckless or intoxicated until such time as he can get in touch with the Provincial Police or other authority, provided that he considers that by allowing such driver to proceed would endanger life and property. And in this connection we would recommend that every driver of every horse and vehicle be compelled to display suitable light for the safety of others. (Signed) Wm. Premier Lea's Opposition to Exhibition Grant Scored At Carmel By Conservative Candidates.

On Thursday evening large crowds attended the meeting at Mont Carmel to discuss the issues at stake in the present Provincial election. Mr. Mathew Poirier was the very efficient chairman. Mr. J. F. Arnett was on the platform with the candidates. The meeting was orderly and all candidates were given a good hearing, the Conservatives were greeted with enthusiastic applause.

Points scored by the Conservatives were on the law enforcement of prohibition, mismanagement of public moneys, non fulfillment of the Liberal platform and other matters vitally important.

Mr. McNutt, (Con.) came out strong for the plank of Old Age Pensions. He referred to the fact that Premier Lea was opposed to an exhibition at Mont Carmel, and only through the united efforts of the Conservative members and Mr. H. A. Darley had the small grant been conceded to Mont Carmel, (applause).

The insincerity of the enforcement of Prohibition was another point scored by Mr. McNutt. He remarked that poor farmers without a lot of money was being spent by the Minister of Public Works in one place nothing was being done in other districts. Mr. Arsenault expressed the opinion that the small tractor was no good, an opinion which was emphatically endorsed by a gentleman in the audience. Mr. Arsenault showed in comparison with the Bell and Lea Governments that the present administration had a yearly increase in expenditure of \$300,000.

Thousands Attended Ceremony At Lennox Island Yesterday.

Glorious sunshine made the annual celebration of St. Annes day on Lennox Island one of pleasure to the thousands of visitors who attended this event yesterday. The visitation of the new Bishop of the Diocese His Excellency Rt. Rev. Bishop O'Sullivan added a new interest to this always interesting occasion. His Hon. Lieut. Governor Dalton with Mrs. Dalton and family attended the ceremony and were given a cordial welcome by Rev. J. A. MacDonald and the parishioners. His Honor mingled with the crowd greeting many old friends. Owing to the thousands who were present the altar was erected outside the church for the celebration of solemn Pontifical Mass by Bishop O'Sullivan which took place at 10.30 a. m. Assisting His Excellency were High Priest Rev. D. D. McGuigan, Deacons of Honour Rev. Fathers Hogan and Murray, Deacon of Office Rev. J. A. MacDonald; Subdeacon, Rev. Urban Gillis, Master of Ceremonies, Rev. P. McMahon. The Mismac choir assisted by outsiders rendered the music of the Mass. An eloquent sermon was preached by Rev. Father Augustine of Newark, New Jersey his subject being love and service of God. After the service was over Ex-Chief Sark read an address of welcome to Bishop O'Sullivan which His Excellency acknowledged in a few gracious words. At 3 p. m. the Sacrament of Confirmation was administered to 15 children by the Bishop who also addressed them. Father Murphy officiated at the Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament. The Bishop and visiting priests were entertained at the Commodious Parochial House adjoining the church. The comfort of the visitors was well looked after by the management in charge.

Mr. Littlejohn. Rev. Dr. Ramsay occupied the pulpit at both services. His morning text was Col. 1-18, "That in all things He, (Christ), might have the preeminence." It was an interesting and instructive address, ably delivered to show that the teaching, the ethics and the principles of Jesus should be applicable everywhere, not only in the individual life, but in our social life, our economic life our national and international relationships. Smoker Planned To Commemorate War Anniversary

On the evening of August 4th, the 17th anniversary of the beginning of the Great War, will be commemorated by local war veterans at a smoker to be held in the Armouries. This will be the first occasion on which members of all the units taking part in the war foregather for a social hour. Previously, smokers and dinners have been held by members of individual units and these functions have been very much enjoyed. To the smoker on August 4th, however, all war veterans are invited. It will be a social free-for-all, at which war reminiscences will be exchanged, old acquaintances resumed, and new friendships contracted. A nominal charge of \$1.00 is being made to cover necessary expenses, and it is hoped the attendance of war veterans will be both large and representative. The smoker, which is being organized by the local branch of the Canadian Legion, will, if successful, be continued in other years. An annual get-together of this kind should prove a great success. The experiences shared during the War form a bond between men of all ranks which grows stronger with the passing years. A new generation has arisen to whom the War is not even a memory but to our veterans the memorable 4th of August, 1914 and the trying months and years which followed until the Armistice on November 11, 1918, are red-letter days, packed with adventure, with experiences gruesome and humorous, with memories bitter and sweet. It is doubtless on the more genial aspect of their war experiences that the veterans will dwell when they foregather at the Armouries on the coming anniversary—but there will be a touch of solemnity to the function also, as they recall the many once familiar faces of absent comrades. The Guardian joins with the many-well wishers of the Canadian Legion in hoping that the gathering on August 4th, will prove an outstanding success, and the forerunner of many similar gatherings in the years to come.

THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press)

MONTREAL, Que., July 26.—Eggs were the brightest line on the Montreal dairy and produce markets last week. Butter was the most bullish, cheese was moderate and firm, while potatoes held at current low levels. Some downward movements were noted in cash grain. The egg market jumped out of its unexciting role of previous weeks. Carlot prices advanced 1 1/2 cents to 2 cents per dozen, becoming generally 22 1/2 cents to 23 cents for extras, 18 1/2 cents to 19 cents for firsts and 16 1/2 cents to 17 cents for seconds. These prices included Ontario and prairie eggs with British Columbia's about one cent per dozen higher. Quotations to retailers were put up one cent per dozen during the week and prices tomorrow will be one cent higher, again, according to new lists announced Saturday. List prices to retailers tomorrow will be 30 cents per dozen for special brands, 28 for extras, 24 for firsts and 21 for seconds for eggs in cartons. Loose eggs are one to two cents per dozen less. Receipts for the week showed a sharp falling off totalling 8,433 cases against 12,408 cases in the previous week. It was the lightest week in egg receipts since February and indicated a definite falling off in productions. On the butter market the feature was a sharp shrinkage in exports. Total shipments last week from the port of Montreal to England were only 1,189 boxes, compared with 5,961 boxes in the previous week. It was the lightest week since the season opened. The wholesale butter prices at Montreal declined one half cent per pound during the week, closing generally at 21 1/2 cents per pound for eastern townships, number one, pasteurized creamery in cartons. At the beginning of the week an advance of one cent was made in prices to retailers, but owing to the steady weakening of the carlot market these prices became shaded later in the week closing at 23 to 24 for solids and 24 to 25 for prints. Receipts were 27,177 boxes. Exports of cheese to England showed a slight improvement totalling 27,325 boxes, against 25,915 boxes in the preceding week. Receipts were heavy, totalling 43,392 boxes. Prices ruled firm, being generally 12 1/2 for Ontario cheese and 12 1/2 for Quebec. The potato market from sixty to seventy cents per 80 pound bag for new Montreal district potatoes about even with the week previous. Supplies were liberal.
