BIBLE SCHOOL CLOSES.—The Third Summer Bible School of the Caledonia Presbyterian Church came to a close on Sunday morning, July 22. This school which is an All-Bible School was the most successful one we have yet held. 84 pupils were enrolled with a daily average attendance for the two weeks of 79 pupils, or 93.7 per cent. The school was in charge of the minister, Rev. Quincy A. McDowell who was well assisted by nine teachers, Misses: Christine Bruce, Mary MacLean, Sadie MacKinnon, Belle Bruce, Annie Bruce, Annie MacGowan, and Muriel Munn, and Messrs: Donald Campbell, and Harry Scheidebantle, a student of Princeton Theological Seminary and who is serving the Presbyterian Church of Murray Harbor South for the summer. This school is graded just as the public schools and each class is taught by an experienced day school teacher or by one equally well fitted to teach. The Closing Exercises of the school and the giving of the awards and Star and Report Cards was held during the hour of the morning worship on July 22nd. During these exercises the young people repeated from memory 200 verses of Scripture and other information about the Bible and Bible History and also sang heartily the Hymns which they had learned during the two weeks school. A crowded church of people expressed their delight with the work that the Bible School had accomplished. On Monday afternoon, July 23, all of those in the Bible School who had not missed more than a day or was late more than twice were taken on an automobile picnic to the shore at Sturgeon. Eleven cars and two trucks conveyed the young folks to the scene of the afternoon's activities. Wading, racing, tug-of-war, and plenty of eats furnished the means of a jolly good time. A Sunset Vesper Service and Friendship Circle had always closed finally the Bible School but a shower of rain drove everyone to the shelter of the cars, so this had to be omitted. But all testify to a fine time, and look forward to the Bible School of next year.

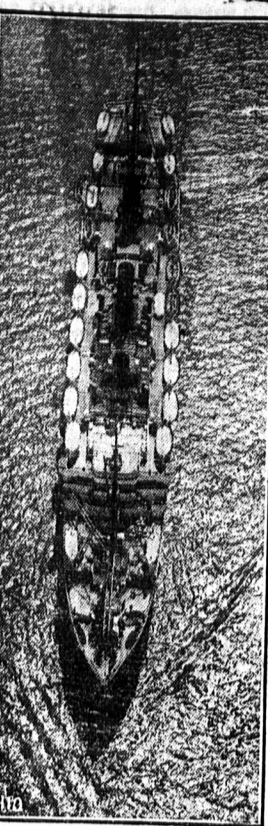


Mr. Robertson too, ministers to an historic congregation, being composed largely of descendants of the United Empire Loyalists, who settled in the district about 1787. These were for the most part Highland Scotch Soldiers who fought in the American Revolution, and on being disbanded at the close of the war, received grants of land in Canada. They continued to be ministered to in spiritual matters by their former Chaplain, Rev. John Bethune D. D. who was the pioneer Presbyterian Minister of Eastern Ontario. Their descendants have been noted for those racial characteristics which have brought the Sect to the front in every department of human endeavor; and they have given many men of note to the country both in Church and State.

MONTREAL, August 1.—There were 84 cattle, 74 calves, 77 hogs and four sheep and lambs, fresh arrivals on the market today. Cattle were mostly of common type and moved slowly. Cutters sold for \$4.00 to \$4.50 and bologna bulls from \$5.50 to \$6.50. Calves were steady with the best veal offered selling for \$11.50. The home market was strong with local butchers paying \$13.50 for mixed loads.
