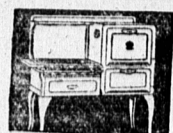

Considers Testing Time for Marriage

Practically Every One of the Catastrophes That Wreck Marriage Could be Avoided if Men and Women Would Spend Their Courtship in Looking Carefully Over What They Are About to Get

If young people would only make the period of courtship a time of serious investigation and study instead of an emotional orgy, they could save themselves a lot of grief and many a trip to the divorce court.

In it they might find out before it is too late all of the things about each other that are vitally important for them to know, and upon which happiness or misery, the success or failure, of their whole future existence depends.

Indeed, it is hardly too much to state that the average couple never hold an intelligent conversation from the time they become engaged until after they are married, and then only too often they find that they have nothing to say to each other.

Otherwise sane and sensible men and women spend the precious days of courtship in billing and cooing and kissing instead of trying to find out something about the other's real character and disposition, and they are so busy asking each other: "Oose ducky is oo?" and "Is oo really, truly, certain sure that oo never loved before, and that oo will never get tired of 'oose little boy or dirr?'" that they omit to ask what are the lady's views on getting up and getting breakfast at 7 o'clock in the morning, and what are the man's reactions on the subject of a regular allowance for a wife's own particular behoof and benefit.

The three things that are at the bottom of the failure of virtually every marriage that goes on the rocks are boredom (or lack of congeniality), or stinginess, or extravagance, for these are the contributing causes that bring about unfaithfulness, endless arguments and quarrels, disgruntlement, resentment that grows into smoldering hate.

Why do men wander from their own firesides? Nine times out of ten because their own heartstones were so dull they could endure them no longer. Their wives were stupid and uninteresting, with a conversational range that reached from the kitchen to the nursery and back again, and so they stepped out in search of livelier company.

Now, to be bored to death is undoubtedly one of the most unpleasant ways of meeting one's latter end, but any man could save himself from this sad fate befalling him if in the days of courtship he paid as much attention to the color of a girl's conversation as he did to the color of her eyes.

And why do married people quarrel? Simply and solely because their tastes and habits are antagonistic, and because they don't think along the same lines. When husbands and wives complain of each other, it is merely because one wants to do something that the other doesn't like to do.

And the same rule would hold good about how each reacted to the money question. Why shouldn't a girl sound a man in the days of courtship about whether he thought a wife should work for her board and clothes or get a pay envelope, and why shouldn't a man ascertain before he undertook to pay for them how many hats a year a girl considered necessary to her happiness.

We speak about the catastrophes that wreck marriage as if they were tragedies that could not be foreseen or prevented. But that is not true. Virtually every one of them could be avoided if men and women would spend their courtship in looking carefully over what they are about to get.

One cup of figs, 1 cup seeded raisins, put through the grinder and sprinkled with 1 teaspoon of soda. Pour over these 1 cup of boiling water, and set aside to cool. Cream 1/2 cup of butter and 1 cup of sugar, and add 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 2 eggs (beaten light), 2 cups of sifted flour, and 1 teaspoon baking powder. There were 22 establishments in Canada in 1929 engaged in the manufacture of ink, according to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. Sixteen of the plants were chiefly engaged in making printing inks or rollers; the other six making writing inks as their main product. The year saw a new high level attained by the whole industry, the output being valued at \$3,038,049.
